Results Expected This Year From Progressive Athletics

Coach Cece Sherwood expects to see his football building program start to pay off this year. He instituted the system last year on the payoff of La Grande's highly successful program which he guided for eight years prior to coming to Roseburg.

Under this program training of potential athletes begins in the fifth grade in order to make possible a number of years of practice and competition.

From this point a player will progress through a seventh grade league and an eighth grade league to the junior varsity which comprises players from the ninth and tenth grades. The final step is the varsity and the culmination of training and practice.

The grade school group has a regular league comprised of the Fullerton, Riverside, Rose and Benson schools which play on Saturday morning.

Each school fields both a Heavy and a Pee Wee squad. In order to avoid injuries weights of the backfield and ends who carry the ball on running plays are limited. Players in this category on the Heavy squads must weigh no more than 105 pounds and for the Pee Wees it is 85. Game rules state that players in this league must wear tennis shoes and all conversions must be place kicked.

The Pee Wees go into action every Saturday at 9 a. m. at Finlay field gridiron. They play six minute quarters with two minutes between each and five minutes between halves. The Heavy's follow the same procedure beginning at 10:15. Both groups start play Sept. 22.

In the seventh grade category coached by Ronald Pinkham 60 kids have turned out for a similar program. In this group the boys are divided into four or five teams which will play a round robin series.

The same rules apply as in the fifth and sixth grades with the exception that players may wear cleats. This group plays either Friday afternoon or Saturday morning on the practice field.

The eighth grade under "Hod" Turner graduates into the out-of-town competition class. This year four out of town games will be played. As yet none have been scheduled.

The Jayvees with a complement of 25 under Coach Norm West and Frank Purdy entered a Jayvee league for the first time this year and sport a full complement of seven games starting with Springfield Sept. 18 at Springfield.

Upon entering the league it was necessary to limit the Jayvees to freshmen and sophomores so there are no experienced men to be had this year. Previously the Jayvees were sophomores and juniors.

Indians Dump Yanks, 8-7 On Ninth Inning Homer; Phils Edge Cards, 1-0

With big Luke Easter as the ringleader, the smarting Cleveland Indians are moving back into the American league pennant race in the role of "spiglers."

Knocked out of contention and blasted by their bosses, the Indians are out to redeem themselves at the expense of the three remaining contenders—Boston, New York and Detroit.

They began to reap revenge last night by defeating the New York Yankees, 8-7, on a three-run homer by Easter in the ninth inning.

The defeat sent the Yankees into second place, a half game back of the Detroit Tigers, who scored a 3-2 afternoon triumph over the Washington Senators. Red Sox Still in Race

Cleveland has one more game with the Yankees, six with the Tigers and two with the third place Boston Red Sox. The Red Sox, still moving relentlessly forward, climbed within a game of the lead by edging the Chicago White Sox, 2-1.

Home runs in the first two innings by Joe DiMaggio, Phil Rizzuto and Yogi Berra shot the Yankees off to 6-0 lead in a rain-soaked game.

Early Wynn was the victim of the Yankee bombardment but after that the world champions were effectively checked by Dick Weik, Sad Sam Zoldak and Steve Gromek.

Homers by Larry Doby and Easter shaved the deficit to 6-4 by the fifth.

It appeared the Yanks had the game in the bag when Jim Hegan grounded out to open the Cleveland ninth. Reynolds Blows Up

Allie Reynolds, who had allowed only four hits, blew up in the ninth and walked two batters. He was hurriedly lifted for Tom Ferrick. Bob Kennedy greeted Ferrick with a run scoring double. Doby struck out but Easter then slammed Ferrick's first pitch over the rightfield fence to break up the game.

The Tigers had rough sledding before squashing the Senators. Old Dix Trout went all the way for the Bengals and permitted eight hits while his mates collected only five off Gene Bearden and Mickey Harris.

Detroit clipped Bearden for two runs in the third on a walk and doubles by George Kell and Vic Wertz. Wertz homered for the winning run in the fifth. The Senators scored in the sixth and added their final run in the eighth on a homer by Ed Stewart.

Lefty Mel Parnell turned in a neat five hitter in recording his 16th victory and eighth straight for the Red Sox under the lights in Chicago. The Sox now have won 24 out of their last 27 games.

Two Frenchmen Battle Tonight For Fight Title

DETROIT — (AP) — Middleweight champion Jake LaMotta is expected to tame Laurent (Tarzan) Dauthuille of France tonight in a promising 15-round title bout at the Olympia stadium. Ring time is 10 p.m. (EST).

But in the city where he wrestled the crown from another Frenchman—the late Marcel Cerdan—15 months ago, LaMotta rules a 5 to 9 favorite. No knock-out is predicted.

Delegates of the National Boxing association convention, which rules LaMotta or Dauthuille must give Robinson a shot at the Crown within six months, will be honored guests.

The NBA disposed of the LaMotta headache yesterday, at least temporarily, by clearing the way for Sugar Ray Robinson to get a midweight title match within six months.

Champion LaMotta has signed to meet Robinson in Chicago stadium during the second week of February. Dauthuille, who fights Jake for the title tonight, has posted \$10,000 to guarantee he'll also fight Robinson in six months. But if Dauthuille beats LaMotta, he first must go through with a return LaMotta match. He has promised to take both fights within six months.

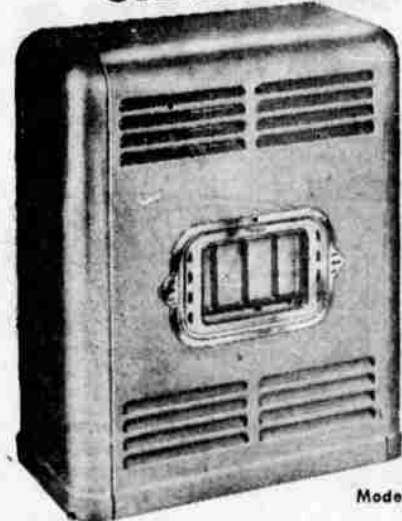
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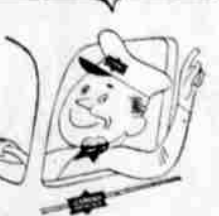
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
