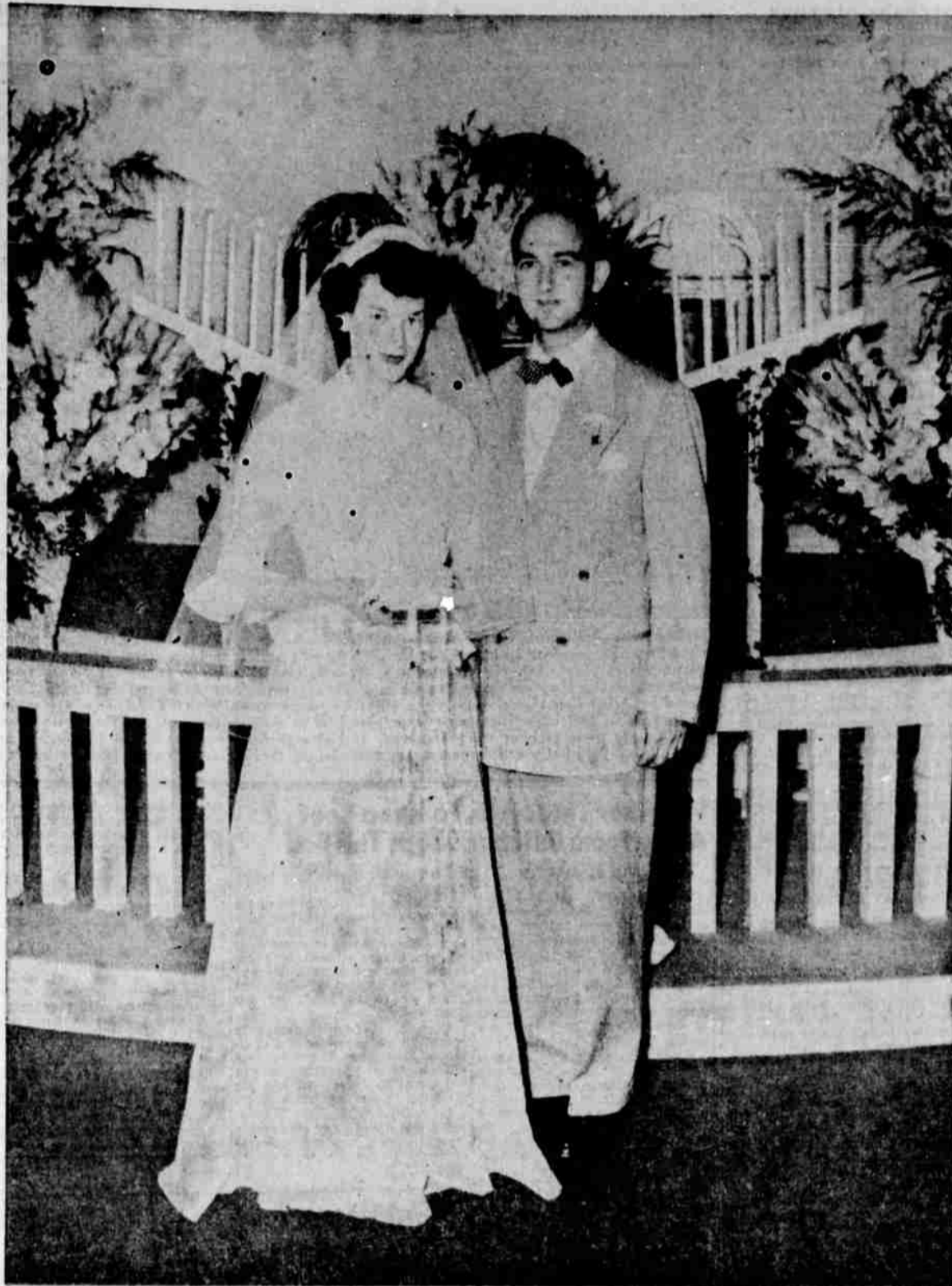


# Jean Yvonne Hiatt Is Bride of Warren Ward
