## Oregon Legislator Would Kill Libel Immunity Law

PORTLAND — (AP) — State Sen. Richard L. Neuberger proposes that the clause in the state constitution giving legislators immunity from libel and slander suits be revoked.

Neuberger asked in a letter that Atty. Gen. George Neuner prepare a resolution striking the clause from the constitution. He said he would introduce it at the next session of the legislature.

The section now reads: "Nor shall a member of the legislature for words uttered in debate in either house, be questioned in any other place."

The clause is identical with that of the federal constitution guaranteeing members of Congress immunity from suits for libel or slander.
