Truman Protests Proposed Ban On Sales To Russia

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman called on Congress today to wipe out a senate-approved proposal to ban aid to countries selling war potential goods behind the Iron Curtain.

He said the proposal is "fraught with danger to the United States and world peace" and would "weaken the free nations more than it would weaken the Soviet bloc."

Mr. Truman previously had been reported to oppose the proposal which the Senate attached to the \$17,000,000,000 emergency defense money bill.

He expressed his views publicly today in letters to the chairmen of the house and senate appropriations committee, just before the house was slated to take up the compromise measure.

The President wrote that nobody can quarrel with the ostensible purpose of the amendment, sponsored by senate Republican leader Wherry of Nebraska, but he said it would accomplish about the opposite of what is intended.

But despite the objections of Mr. Truman and other administration leaders, key men in the house predicted privately that the proposal would be approved.

It would cut off economic help to those countries which sell to Russia or her satellites arms, armaments or commodities which the defense department certifies can be used in the making of weapons. It would not affect military aid to nations receiving U. S. help. The bill is ostensibly aimed at Great Britain and other nations carrying on trade relations with Russia.

It has not been passed on by the House, and House conferees on the appropriation bill refused to agree to it. House approval would insure its inclusion in the bill which goes to the White House.

Chairman Cannon (D-Mo) of the house appropriations committee has opposed the Wherry proposal on grounds it would hamstring agencies administering the foreign economic aid program.

Paul G. Hoffman, head of the Economic Cooperation administration, has said the amendment would "create problems for us and for the European countries."

Gen. Omar N. Bradley, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, made a personal plea to Cannon to oppose the amendment. Cannon quoted him as fearing the proposal would "put us in a very embarrassing position with our allies."

Despite opposition by Hoffman and Bradley, approval seemed probable if for no other reason than that house members seeking reelection don't want to oppose anything that might directly or indirectly slow down Russia.

Holding Of State Jobs For Service Men To Be Asked

SALEM — (AP) — Governor Douglas McKay will ask the legislature in January to hold jobs for state employees who enter the armed forces.

He said that because the United States is not technically at war, the state civil service law is not clear as to whether men and women going into uniform will be eligible for veteran status, and thus qualify for preference in job application, promotions and credits toward retirement.

"I will seek clarification of these points so that Oregonians in service will be entitled to the same rights they were accorded for duty in World War II," the governor said.

He said 140 state employees and seven forestry department officials already have been called into the armed forces.

He said he refused to accept the resignation of one high state official whose unit has been alerted for active service. The governor said he won't accept such resignations because "the state wants to do everything possible to insure that those who make these sacrifices for their country will have something to come home to."

Sainthood Looms For Padre Junipero Serra

ROME — (AP) — Half a ton of records are being brought to Rome for use in a process that may lead to the canonization of Padre Junipero Serra, founder of California Catholic missions.

Documents and writings by the padre and his 18th century contemporaries were taken ashore from a motorship at Naples. The Rev. Eric O'Brien, of Santa Barbara, a member of the Franciscan order of monks is expected to spend two or three years in Rome preparing material for presentation to the Vatican's congregation of rites to begin the process that may lead to sainthood.

Oregon's Share Of Federal Road Money Reported

SALEM — (AP) — Oregon's share of federal highway funds will amount to \$7,755,000 a year for the next two fiscal years. State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldoock said.

The federal road bill was passed last week by Congress. Fiscal year begins on July 1, but Baldoock said the state can begin to contract for projects under the new law as soon as federal census reports are available in November or December.

For the current fiscal year, Oregon is getting \$7,085,000. Baldoock said the 10 percent increase in federal road funds for Oregon was caused by the population increase. With \$5,145,000 a year in state matching funds added to the federal amount, \$12,000,000 a year will be available for the next two years for the federal aid project in Oregon.

Of the \$7,755,000 a year in federal funds, \$3,950,000 will be spent on primary highways, \$2,710,000 on secondary highways, and \$1,115,000 inside cities but on federal highways.

In addition to these amounts, \$2,700,000 a year will be spent on highways inside national forests.
