

Prep School Rules Revised; Should Speed-Up Game

Certain high school football rules changes were made by the national Federation Football Rules committee this summer. The alterations will apply to high school football teams throughout the nation.

In order to acquaint the fan with these changes for 1950, the rules will be printed in entirety. The revisions will definitely apply to District 3 schools.

KICKS — All kicks become dead when they touch in the receiver's end zone. A short free kick which is touched by the kicking team before kick has gone ten yards shall carry a penalty. (It has been left to the editorial committee to decide the penalty.)

FAIR CATCH — The rule has been modified to permit the kick-

ing team to catch its own kick after it has been muffed by the receiver. No period shall be extended if a fair catch has been made during the last timed down of a quarter. However, if a foul is committed by the defensive team the offensive team will have a choice.

FUMBLE — Either team is permitted to advance a recovered fumble or backward pass.

SUBSTITUTION — Free substitution is permitted for any time out when the clock is stopped for the removal of an injured player.

FORWARD PASSES — The present rule prohibits catching or batting of a forward pass by an ineligible player who is on or behind the line. Now included is muffing of the pass. The automatic touchback option for pass interference by A in B's end zone is eliminated. This will now be treated the same as interference by B. If intentional an extra 15 yards will be applied.

HANDING THE BALL FORWARD — Unless the end is the snapper or adjacent to the snapper, he will not have to make a complete turn in order to receive a pass handed forward. Other linemen must make the turn.

Oregon Group Protests Building Of Two Dams

PORTLAND — (AP)—The Oregon Fish commission today ordered its research chief to testify against the proposed construction of two dams on the Cowlitz river in Washington by the city of Tacoma.

Don McKernan, head of the research division, was instructed to appear at a meeting of the federal power commission in Washington, D. C., Oct. 3 to protest construction of the dams.

The projects are opposed on the ground that they would ruin salmon runs. The Cowlitz was described by Arnie J. Suomela, master fish warden as the finest Chinook and steelhead stream of the Columbia river system in Washington state.
