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Beneficiary Of Will Proves To Be Poverty-Vow Nun

NEW ORLEANS — (AP) — The mysterious "Sue" left \$10,000 in the strange will of Charles Babonet of Los Angeles, proved today to be a nun teaching in a New Orleans school under a vow of poverty. She is Sister Eugenia who before entering the Roman Catholic church order of the Daughters of Charity was Evelyn Bogart of Los Angeles. She teaches at St. Stephen's parochial school here.

The tall, pale faced, bespectacled nun, jovial rather than ascetic, confirmed that she is "Sue" to whom Babonet left \$10,000 because she and a neighboring family befriended him some 33 years ago.

She first learned of her good fortune Friday, she said, when her mother and "a gentleman" whom she declined to identify called her by telephone.

Asked what disposition she would make of the money, she replied: "Our life is dedicated to the poor, any money I get will be distributed to help the poor and no one organization will get the lump sum."

"Sue," then a child of nine, was riding in the car of the William Tysons 33 years ago when they picked up Babonet walking along the highway and gave him a happy day at the beach. The Tysons had never seen Babonet before or since but the quiet Austrian immigrant never forgot that day.

"If I live to be 1,000 I never forget that day," Babonet wrote in his will and left the Tysons \$100,000.

Fees, Time Delays Chief Peevess, State Bar Told

GEARHART — (AP) — Attorneys find that most complaints — and there are not many of them — are over fees and time taken to dispose of cases.

That was reported by Oregon State Bar Secretary Lee W. Karr, at the annual convention.

He said only about 150 grievances came to the board of governors in the past year — and one third were over fees and one third were over supposed settlement delays.

Oregon, he reported, has 1855 active lawyers. Ten years ago there were 1881.

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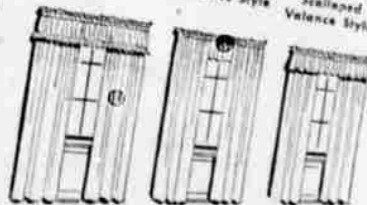
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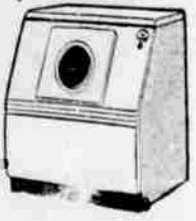


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
