Ford Foundation Will Spend Millions Of Dollars In Plan To Better Human Welfare

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Suppose you had a million dollars a week to spend on your fellow man. How would you spend it? This may sound easy, but it's not. Naturally you would want to put the money where it would do the most good for human welfare. You might not want to hand it over to dear old alma mater or your favorite charity. So you would study the problems that mankind is staggering under. You would decide which problems are the most urgent. Then you would decide which of those urgent problems your money could help solve, and how.

You must take into consideration the other money — governmental and private — that is being spent on those problems, and decide where your dollars are needed the most. This was the task that confronted the trustees of the Ford Foundation two years ago.

The Ford Foundation, now about to begin full-scale activities, is the richest private philanthropic institution in the world. It was created by the Ford automobile family. The foundation owns Ford Motor company stock and other assets valued at 238 million dollars.

Men familiar with Ford operations say this stock would be worth much more, if it were ever put on the market. They estimate that the foundation's assets should yield income of at least 50 million dollars a year, to be used for human welfare.

The trustees, headed by Henry Ford II, appointed a committee of educators who made a lengthy study, during which they interviewed more than 1,000 leading citizens.

Social Needs Put First

They said they would leave to others the continued exploration of the physical sciences, medicine, and public health, because the critical problems of humanity are social rather than physical in character.

The Ford Foundation will concentrate on human relations — "to

acquire more knowledge of man and of the ways in which men can learn to live together in peace in a complex, conflicting, and ever-changing world."

The Foundation will support activities that will (1) contribute to world peace, (2) promote freedom and democracy, (3) strengthen education, (4) advance economic well-being, and (5) increase scientific knowledge of human behavior. The trustees granted 3 million dollars to various institutions for the last-named purpose. That's small compared with grants that are coming.

For some years, foundations have been giving less money toward research in the physical sciences and more toward social research, and the Ford announcement gives a great push to that change of direction.

Grants from foundations have helped to bring many scientific achievements in the past — for example some of the early work on atomic energy, and the discovery of insulin and penicillin, and the conquest of hookworm.

Now, the physical sciences are being aided more than ever before by the government and industrial concerns. And many non-profit corporations are turning to the less explored and more controversial fields of human relations, where government often fears to tread.

Before the name Ford leaped to the top of the philanthropic list, two names dominated the field of private foundations for half a century — Carnegie and Rockefeller.

Andrew Carnegie, the steel-maker, gave away \$350,000,000. Two-thirds of it went into big foundations, such as the Carnegie corporation, which now is rated the second largest foundation in the country, surpassed only by the Ford Foundation.

The third largest is the Rockefeller Foundation. This is one of a number established by John D. Rockefeller and John D. Jr., who gave more than \$550,000,000 between them.

Strike Of London Gas Workers Puts Leaders In Prison

LONDON — (AP) — A 21-day wildcat strike by London gas workers collapsed today under pressure from the labor government.

A few hours after ten alleged leaders of the walkout were sentenced to a month in prison, the 1,400 strikers decided at a mass meeting to return to work Monday.

In addition to the legal action under a law banning unofficial strikes in the public utilities filed, the government had marshaled soldiers and sailors to man the gas works if necessary.

At two gas works, 96 navy technicians moved in to replace striking maintenance men. Another 1,244 soldiers and sailors stood by for duty in 15 other plants if needed.

The strike, involving 1,400 men, had entered its third week today. Gas supplies to 2,000,000 residents of North London have been cut off or seriously depleted by the walkout. The men are demanding a pay raise of three pence (3½ cents) an hour.

A lawyer for the 10 defendants said they would appeal their conviction.

Shouts and muttering greeted news of the prison sentences. The walkout forced the closing of many factories in the affected area, including some engaged in production of vital export goods.
