The new "Jack Kirkwood Show," slated to begin Monday, Oct. 16 over KRNR and the Mutual-Don Lee broadcasting system promises to be the zaniest of all radio shows. Lillian Leigh, who in private life is Mrs. Jack Kirkwood, will play the top feminine roles — a spot she has occupied ever since Kirkwood started his comedy series, "Don Lee's 'Breakfast Show,'" back in 1930. Steve Dunne, a radio veteran of many years and one of the brightest lights in the Los Angeles television scene, has been named as Kirkwood's partner for the new show. U.S. Buys 200,000 Sacks Of Potatoes In Washington

SPOKANE — (P) — The government has bought 200,000 sacks of potatoes in Washington this year under the federal price support program.

Announcement of the purchases made to date came from the Production and Marketing Administration state office as the harvest of early varieties of potatoes tapered off.

A PMA spokesman said the purchases in this state are now below last year's figure for the same date. Purchases have been of the No. 2 (U.S.1-B) grade. The price paid up to Oct. 1 on that grade was 48.5 cents per hundred, with additional allowances for grading and sacking.

Ray Praeter of the PMA office here said the support money paid is about equal to production costs and said he believed producers had made a determined effort to find markets for the early varieties

Conversion Of Japs Now Aim Of Former Victim

LOS ANGELES — (P) — Louis Zamperini, former California track star, once swore vengeance against the Japanese who mistreated him during his two and a-half years in a prisoner of war camp.

Today he is flying by clipper back to Tokyo with a list of the names of his persecutors, supplied by the war crimes commission.

But it is not vengeance he seeks. Zamperini carries, he says, a message of peace and brotherly love. Tracing his one-time captors and converting them to Christianity will be part of his duties, Zamperini says, during a two-month tour of Japan under the auspices of the international Youth for Christ movement.

Zamperini was interned by the Japanese after his air force plane crashed in the sea. He survived 47 days on a life raft.

British Bid For Arms Aid Rejected By U.S.

WASHINGTON — (P) — The United States is about to turn down a three-year British rearmament program calling for approximately \$1,500,000,000 in free American aid.

A note is being drafted at the State department which would rule out any long-term commitment to Britain until specific plans have been agreed upon by all 12 North Atlantic pact nations.

Department officials said last night the note will specify that the United States believes an "interim arrangement" is all that can be decided upon now.

Three Oregon Future Farmers To Get Top Award

WASHINGTON — (P) — Three Oregon Future Farmers of America have been recommended — along with 263 others in 45 states — to receive the organization's American Farmer degree at the national convention Oct. 9-12 at Kansas City.

Those recommended: Robert Warren Estoup, route 2, Freewater; Elmer Otto Lucht, route 3, Molalla; and Merton B. Sahnow, route 1, Cornelius, (member of Hillsboro chapter).

The American Farmer degree is the highest; the FFA award and is based on the farming record, leadership and scholarship. It is limited to members who have been out of high school at least one year and are showing evidence of becoming satisfactorily established in farming.

This year's class is the largest in FFA history. Recommendation for the award, made by the board of trustees, usually is tantamount to election by the convention delegates.
