Anderson joined the quality control staff of the West Coast plywood industry trade group in June 1945. In that capacity, he assisted materially in furthering the quality control program which has helped establish national acceptance of the versatile Northwest product.

## Alabama's Next Governor Promises Prison Clean-Up

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. — (AP) — Governor-nominate Gordon Persons says he is going to clean up Alabama's prison system to eliminate brutality to convicts described in the book "Scottsboro Boy."

Persons said that criticism by Haywood Patterson, 38-year-old Negro fugitive and author, was true.

"I know," said Persons, whose nomination is equivalent to election in Democratic Alabama. "I've been in the prisons myself."

Patterson is one of nine Negroes originally held in the Scottsboro case, in which two white women accused the Negroes of raping them aboard a freight train in 1931. He spent 16 years in prison after his conviction, and escaped in 1948.

## Wages Impaired By Car Shortage

The month of September had no effect on the employment totals in Douglas county. However, the earnings of the workers were seriously impaired. The lumber industry was generally forced to curtail its production schedules because of the railroad car shortage. This was done by reducing the number of hours of work per day and the number of days per week. Much has been said and written about the alleviation of the situation, but little relief has actually been accomplished.

A shortage of qualified workers is still in existence. The demand has been exceeding the supply for some time, and the shortage has spread from largely skilled and semi-skilled workers to cover nearly all classifications. The fact that this area is experiencing the largest number of employed persons for several years is largely responsible.

There was little change during September in the total of claims for unemployment insurance. This total is at its lowest point since the end of the war. The starting of the rainy season will soon release a number of workers employed at logging and sawmill operations in the remote areas.

## Jerry Sconce Gets Lions Club Honor; Topics Discussed

Jerry Sconce of Roseburg senior high school was awarded the honor of being chosen backfield man of the week, based on his performance in the game last Friday night against Medford. The honor was bestowed by the Lions club, at the weekly meeting Thursday night in the Hotel Umpqua. Sconce's name will be engraved on the Lions cup.

There were two speakers for the meeting: Ralph Smith, engineer for KRXL, who talked on the problems and process of establishing a new radio station and going on the air, and Robert Sabin, who spoke on Bill 306, raising the state basic school support from \$50 to \$80 monthly.

Smith traced the development of the radio station. First, he said, it was necessary to determine the area to be served, and the population. Then it was necessary to choose one of five limited local channel frequencies, so, after study, 1340 cycles was chosen. The power of 250 watts was an automatic choice for the area to be covered.

Establishing a location suitable for the area to be served and one to meet both CAA and FCC qualifications was the next problem. After that actual construction could begin. After construction came equipment checks, for which only seven days was allowed to complete, and all tests had to be made from 12 midnight to 5 a. m. Next came proof of performance on equipment for audio frequency response, and testing by FCC inspectors. All these processes were necessary before a license could be applied for, he stated.

## School Problem Faced

The crucial problem of how to educate 26,000 additional children a year in Oregon was brought up by Sabin. He quoted figures to illustrate increased births from 12,000 to 36,000 from 1940 to 1950, whereas in migration increased only 35 percent.

Douglas county's birth increase from 370 children in 1937 to 1393 in 1949 was cited. These are future school children who are here without considering population increases from in-migration. They must be educated, he said.

## Slayer Of Wife, Son Faces Sanity Inquiry

BELLINGHAM — (AP) — A woman and her 7-year-old son were found beaten to death in their home here today after a man telephoned police that he had "killed my family."

Police booked Claude L. Fillingim, 48-year-old Bellingham pulp mill worker, for "murder and investigation regarding sanity."

## LARCENY CHARGE FACED

Curtis Van Standridge, 38, of Kelly's corner is being held in the county jail on \$350 bail, charged with larceny over \$35, reported Justice of Peace A. J. Geddes.

Standridge allegedly stole a one-quarter inch hand drill from W. M. Straight, said Geddes, and was arrested by a deputy sheriff.

## Governor Of Arizona Spurns \$200,000 Bribe

PHOENIX, Ariz. — (AP) — Gov. Dan I. Garvey has announced he does not intend to press charges against an unidentified individual who reportedly offered him a \$200,000 bribe.

The offer, disclosed by Garvey Thursday, was advanced on condition Garvey would appoint a man gambling czar of the state.

Such a position would be open if an initiative measure to legalize gambling is approved at the Nov. 7 general election. Under terms of the bill the governor would appoint a superintendent of a department to supervise and license gambling establishments.

## Orpha Collins' Story Accepted By Magazine

Orpha Collins, local writer, has had an article accepted by "The Alaskan," a magazine published at Haines, Alaska.

The article, entitled "The Saga of Soapy," is a story of the gold rush days of '98 in Skagway and the killing of "Soapy" Smith, leader of a bunch of gangsters and robbers, who met his death at the hands of Frank Reid, solid citizen and resident of Skagway.

Mrs. Collins interviewed two of Roseburg's old timers (sources) on this subject, and from the fact that Judge C. A. Shibrede, formerly of Roseburg, was in Skagway at that time and handled the murder case, the authenticity was established for the write-up.
