**Reactivated Synthetic Rubber Plant Starts Up**  
PORT NECHES, Texas 8 6 8  
The first of the nation's all-purpose synthetic rubber plants to be reactivated began production Thursday — 20 days ahead of schedule.  
United States Rubber company modernized the plant under the government's rubber expansion program.  
The Port Neches installation, designed to produce 60,000 long tons a year, has been modernized to produce more than 72,000 long tons when operating at peak load.

A bid for \$11,200,000 from the Hoffman Radio corporation has been accepted by Los Angeles county Public Administrator Ben H. Brown for Thomas S. Lee Enterprises, it was announced by Lewis Allen Weiss, board chairman of the Lee organization. The sale is subject to approval by the Los Angeles county probate court and the FCC. The package of four AM radio stations, one TV station and one FM station, a new Hollywood studio, contracts with affiliated stations and five million dollars in cash, is covered by 3,750 shares of stock in Thomas S. The sale does not affect Don Lee contracts with the Mutual Broadcasting system and that the Hoffman corporation intends to keep the entire Don Lee communications properties intact. The Hoffman Radio corporation, of which H. L. Hoffman is president, in the event that the high bid is approved by the court, will assume ownership of the properties and will operate them. Mr. Hoffman has announced that there will be no change in the stock ownership of the Hoffman Radio corporation.

**Oregon FFA King Winner Of Many Honors In Career**  
REDMOND — (P) — Jack McCaffery of Powell Butte, winner of the Future Farmers' national farm mechanics award at the Kansas City national convention Wednesday, almost didn't go.  
His mother, Mrs. Neva McCaffery, and others of his family finally persuaded him to make the trip. Jack felt that his help was needed during potato harvest, now in full blast at the McCaffery ranch.

He left Friday of last week with two other members of the Redmond union high school chapter, James Webb and Bob Wilson, delegates. Jack attended in his capacity as state FFA treasurer. He had no inkling he might win the national award.  
Jack, who will be 19 in November, was graduated from Redmond high school last spring and now is a full-time farmer. The national farm mechanics award follows a long line of county, district and state achievements.  
In May he won the FFA district award welding contest at Madras. Then in June he took first in the Oregon state farm mechanics contest.  
At the Dechutes county fair in Redmond last August, Jack was grand champion beef showman, grand champion herdsman and had the best beef exhibit. In the FFA division he entered the grand champion bull and female for beef cattle and took first for his FFA crops exhibit.  
Then in September he received the Buchanan-Cellar cup for the best grain exhibit at the Oregon State fair.  
In addition to his agricultural activities, Jack was on the FFA parliamentary team for three years. He also found time to participate in high school athletics, playing varsity basketball two years.

**VFW Dedication At Brookings**  
BROOKINGS — (P) — Maj. Gen. Thomas F. Sileo, World War II commander of the 1st Division in the Southwest Pacific, has written that he will attend dedication of the new VFW building here, Oct. 15, "if humanly possible."  
Congressman Harris Ellsworth, State VFW Commander R. L. "Red" Henderson, and past State Auxiliary President Marie Dana are also committed to the program which starts at 1:30 p. m. Other veteran and civilian notables are expected from both Oregon and California.  
A special feature of the dedication will be the reunion of surviving charter members of 1934. Frank High, holder of the Congressional Medal of Honor, revived the charter in 1934 after it had been dormant since 1920. He is expected to attend.

**Lobbyists' Dean, Marsh, Retiring**

WASHINGTON — (P) — The dean of the nation's lobbyists, Robert C. Marsh of People's Lobby Inc., is retiring.  
For 32 years Marsh has looked at—and tried to influence — the Washington scene. Now he's 74 and the doctors say it's time for him to rest. At the end of this month, both he and the People's Lobby Inc. will go out of business. People's Lobby Inc., according to Marsh, is supported by 2,000 contributors. He says most of these have small, fixed incomes and that five-sixths of all contributions are for \$5 or less.  
Under the law, lobbyists have to disclose how much they spend. In the Aug. 22 issue of the "Congressional Record" Marsh shows how much he spent for three months.

You'll get an idea from one item. For the entire three months, he said, his lobbying expenditures for "travel, food, lodging, and entertainment" came to exactly \$20.83. After graduating from Grinnell college in Iowa, Marsh kicked around quite a bit. He took post-graduate work in economics, was a Balkan war correspondent in 1912, worked as a lobbyist for better tenement laws in New York. Then he came here as a lobbyist for the Non-Partisan league, which he describes as a liberal farm outfit.

Since then he has pluggued for public housing, unemployment insurance, old age benefits. But he told me he had no idea whether he had helped bring these about. "I play it straight," he said. "I go up before a congressional committee and say: 'We haven't any votes. We haven't any money. Suppose you consider the merits of the legislation for a change.'"

**Army Says New Wire Can Be Laid At High Speeds**

A recently developed new type military field communication wire which can be laid at speeds up to 120 miles per hour from airplanes with good results is now proving effective in combat in Korea, the Department of the Army announced today.  
Particularly suited to airborne operations, the wire combines substantial talking range and other characteristics of standard field wire with the easy carrying of assault wire used by fast moving troops in World War II.  
The improved wire provides a talking range of approximately twelve and a half miles and weighs about 46 pounds per mile. A development of Army Signal Corps engineers, the new design does not require rubber for insulation, thus avoiding dependence in time of emergency upon this critical item.

**U.S. Casualties In Korea Near 25,000**

WASHINGTON — (P) — Announced casualties in the Korean war rose to 24,163 Wednesday — an increase of 3,407 in a week.  
The total announced by the defense department covers 1,800 whose next of kin had been notified through October 6.  
It included 3,614 deaths, 16,289 non-fatally wounded and 4,260 missing in action.  
Of those listed as missing, the department said, 311 have since returned to United Nations military units and 107 have been reported captured or interned by the enemy. This leaves 3,842 still missing as of Oct. 6.  
For the army, the defense department reported 3,124 deaths, 14,497 non-fatally wounded and 4,110 missing.  
Marine corps deaths for the period were placed at 399, non-fatally wounded at 1,710, and missing at 18.  
The air force reported 47 deaths, 10 non-fatally wounded and 102 missing.  
Of a total of 136 navy casualties, 34 were deaths, 72 non-fatally wounded and 30 missing.  
In the case of each service, excepting the marines, some of the total listed as missing had returned to United Nations lines or been reported prisoners since the initial notices that they were missing went to next of kin.
