EUGENE — (AP) — A man and a child were killed and a woman critically injured when a heavy truck crashed into four parked automobiles south of here.

Ivan Raish, 35, and Jimmy Callahan, 4, were killed and Raish's wife, Alma, hospitalized. They were all in one car parked near a narrow overpass on the Pacific highway.

Deputy District Attorney Douglas Spencer reported the truck driver, Thomas L. Emberton, 39, Oak Harbor, Wash., was charged with negligent homicide by speeding. He was released and given 24 hours to raise \$2,500 bond.

Higher Education Bond Bill Will Save Money

SALEM — (AP) — State Treasurer Walter J. Pearson urged all voters to support the State Board of Higher Education bond measure at the November election.

Pearson said the bill would save the taxpayers \$1,200,000.

He explained that the bill would let the board call in its revenue bonds and replace them with general obligation bonds which would bear a much lower interest rate.

The measure, Pearson explained, doesn't give the board any more powers to borrow money.

Pearson said he issued his statements because many persons apparently believe that the measure would cost them money.

Hearing Dated On Plan For Special Deer Seasons

A public hearing will be held in the Portland office of the Game commission Friday, Oct. 20, to determine if four special deer seasons should be held.

The suggested special seasons would be held in the Silverton hills country, northern Lake county; the Burnt river district in Baker county, and the White river area in Wasco county.

The decision to call a public hearing followed closely upon the action of the Game commission which eliminated the "hunter's choice" deer season and extended the general buck season through the 32nd of October in all the state except parts of Lake and Klamath counties where the interstate deer herd special season is being held.

With the elimination of the hunter's choice season it was felt that special seasons should be held in the districts where deer problems are the most urgent.

VFW Objectives Told By Officials To Toastmasters

Bill Ashworth, state vice commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars; G. O. Pike, V.F.W. state service officer, and Dick Preston, Roseburg service officer of V.F.W., were guests at the Roseburg Toastmasters club Tuesday evening. The three veterans spoke briefly on the aims of their organization.

Ashworth told the toastmasters that the V.F.W. was a group of veterans who had served the U. S. military forces outside the continental limits of the country. He said they had banded together to establish and conduct a charitable program. Ashworth said one of the principal aims of the V.F.W. was to promote a vigorous Americanism as simply good citizenship.

Ashworth commented briefly on the Toastmasters' program to establish a speech club similar to the Toastmasters' organization at the Veterans hospital. He said the club should be commended on their good work and said it will help the rehabilitation of the vets.

A question and answer period followed the speech. The entire program was recorded by Del McKay of station KRRR, and will be used on the station's roving reporter program.

On the regular toastmaster program, Bob Walker, Tom Pat, and Jim Duncan gave autobiographical sketches. Pat Turner gave a speech urging all Americans to vote. Turner said the ballot is the only way to preserve the American system.

Mike Dille acted as Toastmaster. The usual Table Topics period was dropped from the program because of lack of time.

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
