MENTAL HEALTH ASSOC.

BPW Club Instrumental In Formulation Of Group

From its modest birth two years ago when the idea was first discussed by women of the Business and Professional Womens club, the Douglas County Mental Health association has grown into a full-fledged working organization.

The goal of the association is to make available to the people of Douglas county, individually or by organizational referral, the services of a full time psychiatrist. It is planned that funds will be obtained through the Oregon State board of health.

This information has been made known as a facet of Business and Professional Women's week, Oct. 15 through Oct. 21.

Although originally conceived by the Business and Professional Women's club, the mental health organization is open to all who are interested. Membership can be obtained by application and payment of the annual \$2 dues.

Present officers of the association are Dr. John L. Haskins, president; Mrs. Paul Geddes, first vice president; Julian A. Helleck, second vice-president and Mrs. Laura Cummings, secretary-treasurer.

Gardiner Railroad Project Readied For Proposals

Alex Stoyanov Engineers, Portland, is accepting bids from a selected list of contractors for the construction of a railroad project between East Gardiner and Gardiner.

The road will be constructed for the Long-Bell Lumber Co. to allow expansion of the firm's manufacturing facilities at the Gardiner mill, and to service a new plywood plant to be constructed. The railroad will be approximately three miles in length and will connect with the Southern Pacific line at East Gardiner. Two plans have been proposed. One will be selected after the bids have been made.

The plans call for either an overpass or a grade crossing at high way 101 near the Smith river bridge. If the overpass is selected, a span of approximately 100 feet will be required. This span would be constructed of steel resting on concrete. Dirt fill and piling would be used to connect with the steel span.

The railroad will be an aid to the present Long Bell mill at Gardiner. This mill is located on the Umpqua river and has deep water facilities to the ocean, but does not have a railroad installation.

Two Killed, 15 Injured In N.Y. Central Wreck

ONEIDA, N. Y. — (AP) — The New York Central railroad's "North Star" express, streaking westward in the darkness, was violently derailed here early today at a cost of two lives and 15 injured.

The fleet passenger train, roaring through this central New York landscape at a 75-mile-an-hour clip, hurled the rails in the heart of Oneida. A steel freight-car door that had fallen in the path of the limited was blamed for the wreck.

Jr. Red Cross Enrollment In Douglas Dated

Miss Ruth Swinney, Douglas county chairman of the Junior Red Cross, has announced that the enrollment campaign for the organization will be from Nov. 1 to Nov. 15. The enrollment fee will be the usual 50 cents per room for elementary schools and \$1.00 per hundred students for the high schools. Money collected over this amount is used for the national children's fund or for aid to overseas children. Dale Bergerson of Roseburg and Miss Eleanor Binder of Elkton, local delegates who attended the Junior Red Cross training camp at Silver Falls this summer, were sent from the proceeds of this special fund.

The most popular of the Junior Red Cross projects are the overseas gift boxes prepared by the school children. Douglas county children have also participated in the international art projects, under the direction of Miss Margaret Carr, art teacher in the public schools, and have assisted with aid to the Navajo Indians. It is the hope of the Red Cross to enlarge these projects and to be able to add more this year.

Miss Swinney has also announced that Mrs. Catherine Mathews has organized a Junior Red Cross council at junior high school. This is the first council to be organized in Douglas county. Miss Nancy Binder is also organizing a council at the Elkton school.

Farm Loan Assn. Names Delegates To Conference

Eugene H. Fisher of Oakland and Lawrence Michaels of Canyonville will represent the Roseburg National Farm Loan association at a four-state conference of NFJA's in Spokane, Oct. 26-27. R. L. Strickle, secretary-treasurer of the Roseburg association, announced this week.

Highlighting the Spokane conference will be the organization of a permanent annual conference of National Farm Loan representatives and establishment of a district advisory committee to work with the Federal Land bank of Spokane, Strickle said.

The local association, together with 66 similar associations in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington, owns all the capital stock of the bank. Loans are made and serviced by the association for this bank.

The delegates will be welcomed to the conference by William A. Schoenfeld, Corvallis, chairman of the bank's board of directors.

Henry Matthew, president, will report on operations of the Spokane bank, and speeches will be given by James R. Isleib, land bank commissioner, Washington, D. C.; John W. Haw, director of the agricultural development department of the Northern Pacific railway, St. Paul, Minn.; Oscar G. Swenson, Malone, Wash., and Walter J. Robinson, Pomeroy, Wash., land bank directors, and E. F. Lyman, Great Falls, Mont., a director of the Rocky Mountain National Farm Loan association.

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
