## Getting Certified Teachers Problem Of School Heads

Roseburg school superintendent and principals attended the two-day Oregon School Administrators association conference in Salem Monday and Tuesday. Attending were Superintendent Paul S. Elliott, high school Principal George Erickson, junior high Principal R. R. Brand, Rose Principal Eli Hall, Fullerton Principal Lyle Eddy, Riverside Principal Earl Ladd and Benson Principal Roy Crain. County School Superintendent Kenneth Barneburg also attended.

The educators broke up into groups to attend sessions pertaining to particular fields of work, for superintendents, elementary, junior and senior highs. County superintendents held a special session Wednesday.

According to Elliott, the principal discussion for superintendents was the problem of obtaining certified teachers for their respective classroom work. At present more than 1800 teachers are employed on emergency certificates, the largest number of all time, including several years.

Several problems relating to teacher certification were worked out, said Elliott. On Tuesday the educators obtained an explanation of the department of education, its division and responsibilities, and heard a discussion on the report of Dr. T. C. Holy of Ohio, who was employed as chief consultant for the legislative advisory committee for education in Oregon.

Laurence Moffitt, Josephine county school superintendent, was elected president of the association.

## Negro Fiend Shot Down By Pursuers

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. —(AP)—A Negro sex offender accused of raping a white farm wife and slaying her four-year-old son remained in a critical condition today with wounds inflicted by members of a posse.

The Negro, 28-year-old Cooper Drake, and the 37-year-old mother, Mrs. Kathleen Holley, both were patients at a hospital.

Drake was shot down Thursday by five members of a posse not far from the isolated Holley home near Calera in central Alabama. Sheriff's Deputy C. H. Fore talked an enraged group of possemen out of killing the wounded Negro after he was felled.

Surgeons spent five hours examining Drake and sewing up a severe stomach wound and wounds in his thighs, torn by buckshot.

Mrs. Holley cried hysterically for her son Dale, who was shot to death as she clasped the child in her arms. She told officers that she herself was raped, shot, beaten and left for dead after a three-hour ordeal.

## Railroad President Beaten And Robbed

CHICAGO —(AP)—Fred G. Gurley, president of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railway, was beaten and robbed near the union railroad station in Denver early Thursday morning, a Santa Fe spokesman said.

The 61-year-old railroad executive, the spokesman said, suffered cuts and bruises in the street attack by three men. He also was robbed of his wallet and watch.

The attack occurred after Gurley had left his private railroad car at union station and went for a walk "to get some fresh air."

Police said Gurley reported he was attacked by three men but he did not want to make a formal complaint.

## FINED ON TWO COUNTS

Merritt Willard Hays, 47, of Bend was fined \$40 Wednesday for being intoxicated in a public place and \$50 for disorderly conduct, reported Justice of Peace A. J. Geddes. Hays was arrested by a deputy sheriff.
