EARNED INCOMES SLUMP IN BRITAIN

LONDON.—(P)—Only 86 persons in the united kingdom were left with an earned income of 6,000 pounds (\$15,800) a year after they paid income and surtaxes for the year, ending in March 1949.

Ten years before there were 6,560 persons in the 6,000-pound-a-year class.

The income-leveling effect of the complex British income tax scheme was demonstrated graphically by the report of the commissioners of inland revenue, published Friday.

The average Englishman in the medium income brackets had to adjust his finances on the basis of a standard tax rate of nine shillings to the pound of earned income—\$1.26 for each \$280 earned.

But the big-time bread winners paid up to 19 shillings, six pence (\$2.73) for each pound (\$2.80) earned in the surtax classification.

So the man with the big pay check was permitted to keep only seven cents of each \$2.80 earned above a certain figure, which varied in different cases.

These rates apply only to "earned income." Revenue from investments is taxed on a different basis. Therefore, the income of many Britons actually is considerably higher than the maximums shown in the income tax schedules.

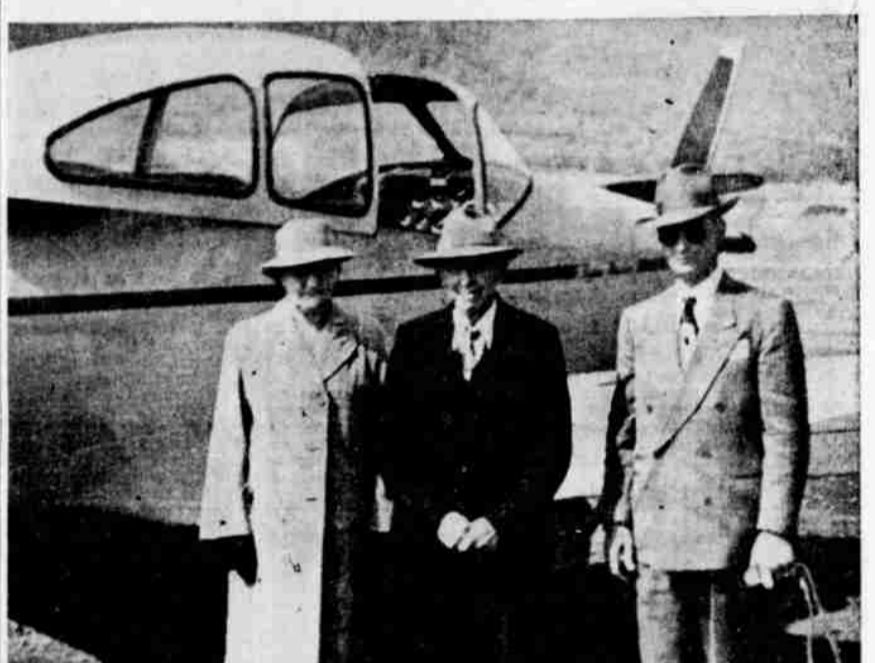
