

Indians Rally For Late Tie, 6-6

Repeated Offensives Halted By Stubborn Indian Defense

The Roseburg Indians squeezed over a touchdown late in the final period to tie a tough Cottage Grove outfit 6-6 in a muddy, rainy game at Cottage Grove Friday night.

Almost the entire first half was played in Roseburg territory, with the Lions reaching Roseburg six, ten, seven and four-yard lines in the second quarter, but the Roseburg line held until Cottage Grove's last drive reached the three. The Lions then rolled around right end for a much-disputed touchdown.

The Roseburg coaches claimed that the runner was knocked out of bounds about a yard and a half before he scored, but the decision stood, and Cottage Grove led, 6-0. **Blank Fells Thrust**

Midway in the third period, the Lions drove deep into Roseburg territory with three straight first downs, but Indian fullback Dale Blank foiled the scoring attempt by making three straight tackles behind the line of scrimmage, and the Lions had to punt. Then, with one minute to go, Roseburg's Jerry Sence took off on two beautiful runs, to advance the ball to the Cottage Grove 17.

Jim Shrum advanced the ball to the 11 as the final quarter started, and with fourth down and one yard to go, Indian quarterback Mickey Coen drove to the four on a sneak through the middle. Sence then blasted through left tackle and into the end zone to tie the count 6-6. **Indians Drive In Second Half**

Cottage Grove got another scoring drive going late in the final period, but it bogged down on the Indian 22-yard line, and the time ran out before either team could threaten again.

In the first half, the Indians fumbled every time they had possession of the ball and Cottage Grove was on the offense almost all the time, but in the second half, with Sence leading, they held onto the ball for one scoring drive. **Dalros Breaks Wrist**

The Indians received a severe jolt, when first string end Skip Dalros broke his wrist and had to leave the game. Then reserve Leroy Elting was sent out of the game on a double foul, and Coach Sherwood had to play halfback Jim McKinney at the end spot.

Telecasts Hurt 1950 PCL Gate

OAKLAND, Calif. — (AP) — Directors of the Pacific Coast league concluded their meeting here Friday after a lengthy discussion on television in which it was agreed that telecasts of baseball either must be restricted or eliminated until a satisfactory financial solution is reached.

The problem will be attacked again at the annual major-league meeting in St. Petersburg, Fla.

Representatives of the eight-club triple A loop were unanimous in the opinion that television had cut down on attendances. They hope to agree on a suitable method to license telecasting to overcome reduced gate receipts.

The matter of limiting club salaries next season was not discussed, or at least no action was reported for publication.

The directors, however, are known to favor such a move in view of the fact that all clubs reportedly lost money this year over the 1949 season.

Eugene Takes Albany, 25-13; Pirates Win

Eugene overcame a first-period heart attack to defeat Albany, 25-13, and become the unquestioned District 4 favorite in the high school football chase last night.

Eugene had palpitations, though, when the lighter Albany team opened with a rush, and sent their standout back, Cub Sexton, charging over for two first-period touchdowns and a 12-0 lead.

The Axemen rallied, however, and by halftime Wally Russel had passed them into a 13-13 lead. Then an 80-yard kickoff return by Manning Barber to open the second half sent the Axemen further in front. They wound it up with full-back Jerry Aiken plunging for still another touchdown.

Other favorites also came through. Rock Grande in District 1 vanquished Pendleton, 19-0. Prineville remained unbeaten in District 2 by downing Lakeview, 19-0, its 14th straight victory.

Marshfield, the District 3 favorite, went outside the district to score its seventh straight win, a 44-25 victory over Ashland. Longview remained unbeaten and untied in District 7 by walloping Seaside, 49-6.

The defending state champion, Grant, romped to its 18th straight victory, dumping a big Jefferson team, 20-6. Roosevelt also remained unbeaten and untied in the Portland race by trampling Cleveland, 41-0.

The already clouded District 5 race became more so as Estacada rose up to hold unbeaten Woodburn to a scoreless tie.

Oregon City remained a threat to Hillsboro in District 6, showing strength in downing Milwaukie, 40-18. Hillsboro was to engage Longview, Wash., today.

Forest Grove absorbed a 63-6 licking from Tillamook, but it was almost a moral victory. That Forest Grove touchdown was the first of the year. It came from a Tillamook fumble that Forest Grove recovered on the Tillamook 10-yard line. A pass then accounted for the score.

Klamath Falls came from behind late in the game with a 94-yard kickoff return by Rod Davis to headkick the always straight Boise, Ida., team 12-12.

Blast Leveled At Earl Blaik For Comments

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — As a result of his uncompromising evaluation of professional football, Earl (Red) Blaik, head coach at Army, today faced the unhappy prospect of having to prove it.

The colonel may now include among his dissenters about every pro coach in the country; his No. 1 pupil at Army, Glenn Davis; pro players, some college coaches, an assortment of plain citizens and the American Legion.

Blaik's most famous performer at West Point, submitted his resignation politely. "I have a sincere respect for Colonel Blaik," said the onetime Mr. Outside, now starring for the Los Angeles Rams. "However, I have found pro football to be a much more demanding sport than the college game."

Blaik's other critics weren't so polite. In fact, some were downright rude, notably Joe Stydahar, head coach of the Rams. "Outside," he said, "is a few words of rudeness. Blaik says a 190-pound line-man fresh from college can do everything better than a 250-pound pro. That's like saying an amateur lightweight could whip Joe Louis in his prime."

"We're able to drop the Eagles and Bears from our schedule when we found them too tough—as Blaik dropped Notre Dame—we might run up a 23-game unbeaten streak, too."

George Halas, under whom Stydahar played with the Chicago Bears, merely said, "I didn't know Blaik was that stupid."

State Jobless Board Will Drop 36 Employees

"Boy Bandit" To Face Herb Parks In One-Hour Headliner At Armory

Confident Gordon Hessel, the "Boy Bandit" from Albuquerque, N.M., will meet Herb Parks, aggressive and hard-working Canadian from Vancouver, in the one-hour, three-fall headliner on matchmaker Elton Owen's wrestling show at the Roseburg armory arena tonight.

Pro Gridders Slate 10 Games

NEW YORK — (AP) — Ten of the 13 National Football league teams will see action tomorrow, with the Cleveland Browns-New York Giants clash at the Polo Grounds heading the agenda.

All six American conference clubs are down to play, with two National conference contests rounding out the schedule.

In addition to the Browns-Giants game, others listed in the American section are: Philadelphia Eagles at Pittsburgh Steelers and Chicago Cardinals at Washington Redskins.

The National games send Detroit to San Francisco and Baltimore to Los Angeles.

First place will be at stake when the front-running Browns invade the home of Steve Owen's Giants. Although the New Yorkers handed the conference leaders their lone defeat, 6-0, on Oct. 1, Cleveland is expected to turn the tables and make its season record five victories against one loss.

The Giants take a 3-1 record into the game. They tied up the Browns' pass master, Otto Graham, in their previous meeting but no team has been able to score two straight over the club that won the All America conference crown four straight years.

The Eagles also could overtake Cleveland by trouncing the Steelers while the Browns lose. Green Bay's Philadelphia team, thrice victorious since losing its opener to Cleveland, is riding high now and promises plenty of trouble for Pittsburgh.

At Washington, a throne is looked for as Choo Choo Justice, an All-American with North Carolina, makes his pro debut with the Redskins against the Cardinals. These teams are tied for the cellar spot with identical 1-3 records.

In the National games, the San Francisco 49ers and Baltimore Colts both will be seeking victory. No. 1 this season, the 49ers have one 0 for 3 and face a tough assignment against Detroit. The Colts, winless in four starts, are likely to remain in the cellar against the rambunctious Rams.

LOS ANGELES—(AP)—A 67-foot homecoming bonfire blew up last night in the middle of thousands of celebrants on the campus of the University of California at Los Angeles. The explosion injured nine persons, none seriously. Windows several blocks away were shattered.

Vikings Beat Sutherland, 7-0, In JDJ Game

The Myrtle Creek Vikings evened up the win-loss column by defeating Sutherland, 7-0, on their home field, Friday afternoon.

The game was finished in the scoring department midway in the first quarter. It was then that Vikings Kamp faded back to the midfield stripe and loosed a 20-yard pass to Bob Wilder behind the secondary, who went the remaining 30 yards untouched.

From then on, it was a see-saw affair as neither team could get an offense rolling on the muddy, rain-drenched gridiron. The thrill of the game was packed into the last fleeting seconds of the game as the Bulldogs tried frantically to force a possible tie. They were passing with abandon from their own territory and one of the passes went awry, settling in the arms of Myrtle Creek's Don Gillespie.

Gillespie gathered in the pass on the 50 and threaded his way down the sidelines, sending the crowd into a frenzy. He was tackled on the one-yard line and scooted over. The ball was ruled down on the one as the gun sounded.

This was the first JDJ win for Myrtle Creek and the third league loss for Sutherland.

Closure Of Burn Area Advocated

McMINNVILLE — (AP) — Complete closure of the Tillamook burn area to gun hunting of deer was recommended by the Yamhill County Sportsmen's association Thursday night.

Action came only after spirited discussion, with sportsmen closely divided in the view of whether closure would build up the dwindling deer population or bring over-population and starvation.

The majority concurred in the opinion that there is sufficient browse on western slopes to handle an increased deer population. Browse on eastern slopes is scanty.

The recommendation — which follows that made unsuccessfully a year ago by the Tillamook Rod and Gun club — will be presented to the Central Willamette council, Oct. 30, at Albany. If the council concurs, the Oregon Wildlife federation will be asked to make the closure recommendation either to the State Game commission or to the legislature.

Boundaries would follow closely the area of the 1937 fire. The recommendation made no mention of bow-and-arrow hunting.

The group also approved a resolution calling for transfer of game law enforcement duty from the state police to a special Game commission enforcement body. Bob Ballard, president, said Oregon is the only state in which game law enforcement is in state police hands.

Beaver Trapping Program Planned

Beaver population in agricultural areas of the Umpqua basin has reached the saturation point, reports James Vaughn, district game supervisor. Vaughn told Umpqua Conservation council representatives at a meeting Friday night that plans are being made for an extensive trapping program to reduce agricultural damage caused by beaver.

Land owners suffering damage are urged to contact the Roseburg office of the Game commission. Vaughn said. The trapping program will be designed to remove as many of the offending animals as possible.

The Game commission's efforts to restore depleted beaver population has "worked too well" in some areas Vaughn reports. On the other hand, poaching and predators have kept populations too low in the high mountain regions where the animals are most needed.

Beaver are subject to fatal epidemic diseases when they congregate too thickly, and trapping activities not only will reduce damage but will benefit health of surviving animals, Vaughn states.

Property owners receive one-third of the proceeds from sale of pelts taken from animals trapped on their lands by commission employees.

Umpqua Salmon Fishing To Close

Anglers have only a few days left in which to take salmon from the upper waters of the Umpqua river, reports William Pitney, resident fishery biologist. Many sports anglers seem to be unimformed concerning season regulations, Pitney says.

Anglers now may take only salmon and steelhead, 20 inches or more in length, above tidewater, he said. No trout fishing is legal. The season on salmon, above tidewater, closes Oct. 31. Steelhead, 20 inches or over, may be taken until Feb. 28.

Anglers are not permitted to retain trout caught incidentally while fishing for steelhead.

Pitney advises that where illegal fish are hooked on bait, the leader be severed as near the eye of the hook as possible and that the fish be returned to the water. A fish is able to rid himself of the hook in a short time, he said, and will not be injured. Effort to remove the hook, however, particularly if the fish is hooked deeply, are apt to prove fatal.

Salmon and steelhead fishing in tidewater, below the highway bridge at Scottsburg, will remain open until Feb. 28.

Pitney urges that any anglers having unreported trout tags taken during the season send them at once to the Roseburg office of the State Game commission, telling the date and location of the catch.
