PORTLAND — (AP)—Andrew J. Bushman, 37, Chiloquin, Friday drew an 18-month prison term for using the mails to defraud. He pleaded guilty.

After his term ends, he will be on probation for five years.

Evidence presented in federal court was that Bushman, employed by a nearly blind person, wrote letters to his employer and signed

the name of his employer's sister, asking for money. He mailed them in Klamath Falls, then opened them and read them to his employer who from time to time, gave him money to mail to the sister. Bushman kept it.
