

### Aircraft Carrier For A-Bomb Hops Urged By Vinson

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Rep. Vinson (D-Ga) proposed the immediate construction of a new 60,000-ton aircraft carrier designed for A-bomb flights from its deck.

Vinson, chairman of the house armed services committee, has prepared a bill for introduction of the forthcoming short session of Congress authorizing the navy to go ahead on a new "super-carrier."

The biggest carries of the navy now has are the 45,000-ton type; only recently has one of them reported the landing on its flight deck of a plane capable of carrying the A-bomb. Previously large bombers had taken off from their decks.

Both House and Senate are considered likely to approve Vinson's super carrier proposal.

Vinson said he thought the program should be pushed as fast as possible. And without saying so directly, he implied it had administration approval and would not be opposed by the military joint chiefs of staff.

Vinson's bill would limit the new carrier to a top of 60,000 tons, or about 20,000 tons lighter than the navy's proposed flush deck carrier which former Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson knocked in the head last year.

Vinson told reporters the new carrier presumably would follow along lines of a vessel now in the planning stage at the Navy department. He said it may not be a true flush deck carrier—that is with no superstructure breaking the flight deck line—but that it would closely approach a true flush deck design.

### Economy Cabbage Tops For Sunday

Cabbage is cheap now. It's top quality food, too. So we tried a few cabbage recipes from the Mennonite Community Cookbook. It's a gold mine of down-to-earth wonderful recipes. All the family liked these three particularly.

**Baked Cabbage**  
Serves 6

One medium-sized head of cabbage, 1 teaspoon salt, ¼ teaspoon pepper, ½ cup grated cheese, 1½ cups hot milk, 1 tablespoon flour, 2 tablespoons butter.

Cut cabbage in wedges ¾ inch thick. Cook in salt water for 10 minutes. Drain and place cabbage in a greased casserole. Sprinkle with flour, salt and pepper. Dot with butter. Add hot milk and top with grated cheese. Bake at 350 degrees F. (moderate oven) for 35 minutes.

**Creamed Cabbage and Dried Beef**  
(Serves 4)

One-half large head of cabbage, ¼ pound dried beef, 1½ cups medium white sauce, ¼ cup buttered crumbs.

Cook coarsely chopped cabbage in salt water until tender. Drain. Soak chopped dried beef in ½ cup warm water for 10 minutes. Place cabbage and dried beef in alternate layers in a greased casserole. Pour white sauce over mixture and top with buttered crumbs. Bake at 350 degrees F. (moderate oven) for 25 minutes.

**Dutch Cabbage**  
Serves 6

One medium-sized head of cabbage, 6 slices bacon, 2 tablespoons flour, 3 tablespoons fat, 1 teaspoon salt, ¼ teaspoon pepper, 6 medium-sized potatoes, 2 cups cabbage broth or tomato juice.

Shred cabbage coarsely and cook in salt water until tender. Cut bacon in small pieces and fry until crisp. Blend flour with 3 tablespoons bacon drippings and brown. Add seasoning and liquid or tomato juice to make a gravy. Add sauce to cabbage and place in a greased baking dish. Cook potatoes in salt water until soft and then mash them. Put mashed potatoes on top of the cabbage. Bake at 375 degrees F. (moderate oven) for 25 minutes.

### Release Of Reservists In Navy Begins In 1951

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The navy announces that it will start releasing reservists next year — enlisted men, petty officers and officers in October.

Those reservists to be released are men who will be recalled to active duty involuntarily by the end of this year.

The navy cautioned, however, that it will continue to call up reservists "for the foreseeable future."

The navy said it will require about 21,000 reserve enlisted men during the first six months of 1951. This number will be divided approximately equally between petty officers and non-rated personnel.

After next July 1, the navy plans to recall about 5,000 non-rated reservists each month and what it described as a negligible number of petty officers.

### 32 States Will Choose Governors In Nov. 7 Vote

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Presidential hopes of many men for 1952 and later years will be riding with the ballots in next Tuesday's election of 32 governors.

Gubernatorial contests always have some presidential tinge. Traditionally, they are proving grounds from which emerge future Presidents—and leaders with powerful voices in naming presidential nominees.

And aside from the rise and fall of individual political stars, a political party's capture of a state government is regarded as improving its chances to carry the state in the next presidential election.

Of the 32 contests for governor to be settled Nov. 7, no fewer than 10 have captured especial national interest.

Top, perhaps, are those in New York and California.

New York, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, who carried the Republican presidential banner in 1948 and 1952, faces a hard fight in his quest for a third term as governor. His Democratic challenger is Rep. Walter A. Lynch.

In California, Gov. Earl Warren, Dewey's 1948 national running mate, seeks reelection over the challenge of James Roosevelt. There you have the political big name veteran fighting for survival against the threat of a son of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt, a young man who hopes his star is only on the rise in Democratic skies.

The nation now has 29 Democratic and 19 Republican governors, including Gov. Frederick G. Payne (R), reelected in Maine last Sept. 11. The 32 governorships at stake in November are held by 17 Democrats and 15 Republicans. Whichever party scores the greater gain
