The veterans bonus bill would pay a maximum of \$600 to veterans each month of domestic service and \$15 for each month of overseas service. But the margin in favor of this measure was too small to be conclusive.

The old age pension bill was passed by a 2 to 1 margin. This is the bill passed by the legislature, but attacked by referendum by Joe E. Dunne's pension group because of the clause giving the state power to take over estates of some deceased pensioners.

Daylight Savings Loss — Oregon communities won't be allowed to go on daylight saving time because the standard time bill was passed yesterday. It provides that there can't be any daylight saving time in the state unless the governor proclaims it for the whole state.

And the governor couldn't proclaim daylight time unless adjoining states have it, too.

Reapportionment of the state legislature, in an initiative sponsored by the Oregon Farm Bureau federation, apparently was defeated, although not by a large margin. This bill was attacked by labor and other farm groups.

Three other measures apparently were passed. They would increase legislators' pay from \$400 to \$1,200 a session, let the state board of higher education refund dormitory bonds, and increase the bonding limit for veterans' farm and home loans.

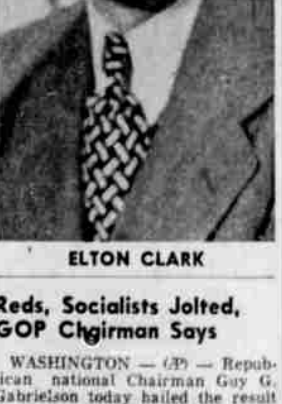

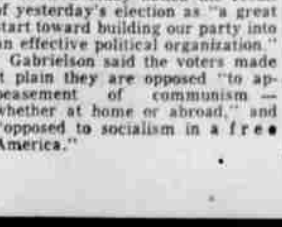
