Mrs. Clem Schneider, who has been ill for a week at her home, is reported to be improving.

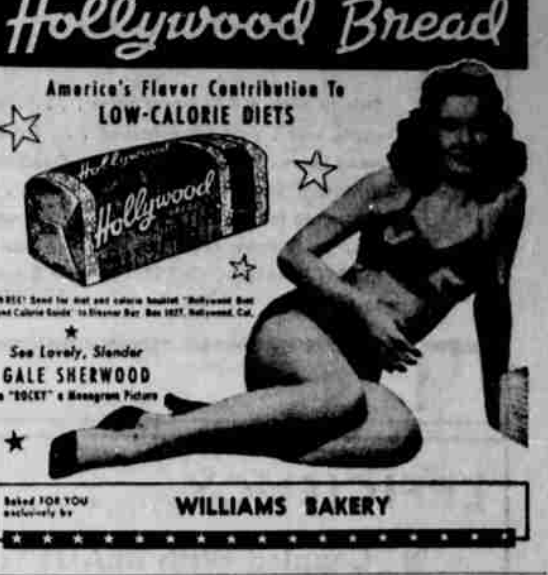
