

Golden Bears Appear Cinch For Third Consecutive Bid To Pasadena For Rose Bowl

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Unbeaten, untied California, with the finest football record of the lot and one conference game to go, has just about wrapped up its third consecutive bid to the Rose bowl.

Only a setback by Stanford, Nov. 25, not expected and which would be a major upset, can check the charging Bears in their championship drive. Standings could be tangled in such an event but California probably would emerge with the best performance chart for the season, anyhow.

The team Coach Lynn (Papay) Waldorf described in September as being "the greenest material of any major college in the country" reached its peak last Saturday with a stunning 35-0 victory over the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins. Waldorf now says this is the best club he has turned out in four years at California.

The Bears' rugged defense stopped U.C.L.A. from scoring for the first time this season. Cal Line Rugged

As of this week, California has won 32 regular season games and 22 conference contests in a row since 1947. Only Rose Bowl defeats, 14-20 by Northwestern and 14-17 by Ohio State mar an otherwise great record.

San Francisco Slated

The Bears meet University of San Francisco this weekend. The non-league game should prove merely a workout. California's annual meeting with its oldest rival (since 1892), Stanford, will follow. It will attract another capacity throng to Berkeley.

Before the season started, Stanford was the choice of most observers to win the bid and go to the Rose Bowl. The Indians failed to deliver. Their record includes losses to U.C.L.A. and Washington and a tie with Southern California. Last week they had to come from behind to beat Washington State, 28-18.

Huskies Favored

Washington, 27-12 winner over Oregon last week ravelled to Los Angeles to take on Southern California, Saturday. The northern Huskies may win his one and beat Washington State a week later to remain a mathematical chance for a possible bid in the final standings.

California must drop its last league game to make a deadlock possible. Anyhow, he Bears outpinned Washington 14-7 two weeks ago.

The Huskies will be mild favorites to win from U.S.C., chiefly because of superior passing. Oregon Sae and Washington Sae clash in a conference engagement he now shapes up as fairly even, or possibly an edge to O.S.C. West by improvement has been needed by the young Oregon team. Earlier in the season, Idaho tied Washington Sae, 7-7.

Oregon goes to Boulder for a game with Colorado; Idaho crosses the country to meet Boston University and Monona will be host to Utah Sae in what may be close encounters. Monona will be surprise victim of Nevada, 19-14 last week, he first win of the season for the last.

A total of twenty-five other Nationalist leaders were charged during the weekend. Most of them were accused of subversive activities. District attorneys investigating the revolt said all Nationalist leaders now were under arrest and the first part of their investigation had been completed.
