**Morse May Get Foreign Policy Making High Post**

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A senate committee vacancy fight threatened today to develop a challenge to Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) as chief Republican spokesman on foreign policy.

Despite an assumption by Vandenberg that Senator Morse (R-Ore) will get the place, some Republicans went ahead with efforts to block Morse off the senate foreign relations committee.

In this connection, they were reported raising as an issue Morse's pre-election criticism of Senator Milliken (R-Colo.), chairman of the conference of all Republican senators. That group will pass finally on GOP committee assignments in the new Congress.

Morse told a news conference yesterday he takes it for granted that a pledge made by Vandenberg in the Republican caucus in 1946—and renewed in 1948—will give him the vacancy which the Republicans will fill on the foreign relations group.

To support his stand, he produced a letter from Vandenberg,

**Chinese Reds Offend India; Nehru's Next Move Question**

India's second protest to Peiping regarding Communist China's military invasion of little Tibet has brought a verbal slap in the face which one would think might impel Prime Minister Nehru to reconsider his policy of neutrality in East-West affairs.

According to a Peiping broadcast the Chinese government declares that it "will not tolerate foreign interference," since Tibet belongs to China. And that is tough talk in any language.

The big question of course now is, what will Premier Nehru's next move be?

Appropos of this situation it is of more than passing interest that Nehru yesterday told parliament the government had decided to

maintain a highly efficient and mobile army in view of central Asia's unsettled conditions. He added that the army will be maintained in strength.

The argument about Tibet is a complicated one. India's interest in the matter presumably is based mainly on two points:

1. Tibet lies on India's northern border and a most uncomfortable position would be created if an unfriendly power occupied the little country.

2. India presumably feels that she has inherited the obligations which Great Britain assumed regarding Tibet during England's rule in India. Britain recognized Chinese suzerainty over Tibet on the understanding that China recognized Tibet's autonomy.

But what further can India do now, in view of the Chinese refusal? She would seem to have gone as far as she can on her own responsibility. Tibet has appealed to the United States for aid, but there appears to be small chance at the moment that the U. N. will intervene.

However, China's sharp rejection of the protest is bound to remind India that a middle of the road policy doesn't work with Communism. There is no give and take. You can't do business with them excepting on communist lines.

Moreover India can't escape the certainty that if the Communist steam roller keeps on moving in Asia, it will hit India sooner or later—probably sooner. Thus we have a situation in which it will be most difficult, if not impossible, for India to maintain a position of neutrality.

Many observers have been looking on Nehru as the coming leader of the Democratic forces in Asia. He is a dynamic personality and a man of great capabilities, who spent his life fighting for Indian independence. But most observers venture the criticism that if he is to become the Asiatic leader it will call for a positive stand, in the great battle of the isms.

**Last Minute Agreement Bans Television Strike**

NEW YORK — (AP) — Last-minute concessions Sunday avoided what would have been the first coast-to-coast strike in the television industry.

The settlement came only 35 minutes before actors, singers, dancers and announcers of the AFL Television authority were to march against three networks and New York station WOR-TV, which originates one network program.

The strike would have involved 25,000 TV entertainers, grouped in five unions and all represented in television by the authority.

Later Sunday, one of the five unions, the American Federation of Radio Artists, announced a separate settlement of a contract dispute with the four major radio networks. The terms provided pay in creases of from 15 to 30 percent. Scales were not announced.

**Council Bluffs Fire Does \$100,000 Damage**

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Ia. — (AP) — Fire which flashed through a portion of a downtown business block here this morning left one fireman dead, caused estimated damages of \$100,000 or more and routed 21 families from a nearby apartment. The fireman, William Cavitt, was overcome by smoke.

The fire started in a three-story brick building housing a tavern and furniture store. Also destroyed was a hardware company, one of the largest in southwest Iowa, and a breeder supply warehouse.
