

Apartment Occupant Charged With Arson

EUGENE — (AP) — Guy E. Carlton, 43, was arraigned in district court Monday on a charge of first degree arson. He waived a statement and bail was set at \$2500. Fires sent firemen racing to Carlton's Eugene apartment Saturday afternoon and again Sunday. He was taken into custody after Fire Chief E. L. Surfus signed a complaint based on preliminary investigation of the fires. According to Surfus the first alarm led firemen to discover three separate blazes in Carlton's apartment. Two new fires, in previously untouched sections of the apartment, were extinguished after the second alarm. Surfus estimated total damage at \$1000.

Soldier Writes Of Night Terror Against Chinese

SAVANNAH, Ga. — "Mom, we didn't have a chance." So wrote a Savannah soldier of a "night of terror" in which he said his unit was almost wiped out by Chinese Reds using war dogs.

The letter was written Nov. 4 by Pfc. Charles Edward Bell, 20, who wants to be a minister, to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Bell.

He said only 300 men of a First Cavalry division unit of 2,000 men escaped from a fierce assault by Chinese Reds only 10 miles from the Manchurian border.

"We lost lots of boys the other night," he wrote. "We got caught with our pants down. We thought it was over. But it's not."

"We were about 10 miles from the Manchurian border when they hit. We didn't think the Chinks were even in on it. But they are. We had to move out and leave our tent."

GOP Women Oppose U.N. Flag Equality Display

ELLENSBURG — (AP) — Display of the United Nations flag "in a position equal to or above" the U. S. Stars and Stripes was opposed in a resolution adopted here by the national board of Pro-America.

The women's Republican group also went on record against "any treaty which puts the decrees of a world court above those of our own country."

The board also opposed the recent appointment of Anna M. Rosenberg of New York as defense department director of manpower, opposed "world government movements," and urged defeat in Congress of the genocide convention resolutions submitted by a division of the United Nations.

Chemist Said Gratitude Led Him To Spy Work

NEW YORK — (AP) — Chemist Harry Gold says he became a Soviet atom spy partly out of gratitude to a man who gave him a job during the depression and because he wanted to help the Russian people.

The mild-mannered Gold testified in the trial of engineer Abraham Brothman and his business associate, Miss Miriam Mostowitz — both accused of conspiring to obstruct justice during a federal spy investigation.

Gold told a federal court Friday he drifted into espionage out of a "debt of gratitude" to a "Mr. Black" who got him a job in 1933 — "the worst year of the depression."

"As a family," Gold said, "we had a fierce sort of pride and hated to go on relief."

He said "Black," whom he further identified as a chemist, tried to get him to join the Communist party.

Gold said he refused because "I thought they were a lot of whacked-up Bohemians."

But "to get Mr. Black off my neck" about joining, Gold added, he became one of the party's espionage agents.

Recount On Power Bill Sought By Prosecutor

SEATTLE — (AP) — Prosecutor Charles O. Carroll said he would see a complete recount of the Nov. 7 vote on Seattle's "Proposition C."

It was the measure to authorize municipally-owned city light to buy Puget Sound Power and Light Co. facilities in the city for \$25,850,000.

The furor started discovery of a vote count error that made it appear the proposition will win out on the final official tally. It had trailed by 832 votes in unofficial totals after election day. It had been virtually given up as lost.

The combination of the corrected error and the absentee ballots now make it look as though the measure would carry.

Carroll jumped into the picture yesterday because, he said, there had been increased activity in Puget Power stock trading before the King county auditor's office announced discovery of the vote tally error. Quotations on the stock rose yesterday after the announcement that the measure probably would squeeze through.

Carroll, who has pleaded guilty to espionage charges and will be sentenced Dec. 7.

The Philadelphia chemist said Brothman and Miss Moskowitz got him to lie to the FBI and a federal grand jury to cover up their activities in a soviet spy ring.

Gold himself is accused of acting as a go-between for Russian agents and jailed British atomic scientist Dr. Klaus Fuchs.

He decided to act as a wartime spy, he said, "to help the Russian people and not the Russian government."
