WASHINGTON—(AP)—"Achesonian Jackassery," snorted Senator Millikin (R-Colo.).

The chairman of the conference of all Republicans in the Senate was giving reporters his reaction to Secretary of State Acheson's recent attack on Republicans who want to reexamine U.S. foreign policy.

Acheson compared "reexaminists" to farmers who pull up their crops to see how they are growing. Later he explained he did not oppose a review of foreign policy but only such a reexamination as would "uproot" it.

Asked if he were a reexaminist, Millikin replied that he was like the farmer who goes into the fields to pull up weeds. He defined weeds as "bad policies."
