Public Library Offers Books For Reading Aloud

About the same time the high button shoe and the mustache cup disappeared from the American scene, the old family custom of reading aloud vanished into oblivion. Charles Laughton, in a very amusing article in "This Week" magazine for Nov. 19, has gone a long way towards restoring reading aloud to its rightful place in the pattern of pleasant living. He makes it sound like more fun than canasta and away ahead of television for bringing family and friends together.

"No sonnets for me," says Mr. Laughton, "and I'll have none of your authors with rarified vocabularies. But at the head of my reading-aloud list I put the Bible, certain of Shakespeare's plays, Mark Twain, the short stories of O. Henry, James Thurber and the verse of Rudyard Kipling."

Here are Laughton's rules for those who have had the secret urge to read aloud. Just get started, he advises, and then remember these points: (1) Choose books you want to read. (2) Take your time. Be faithful, but don't make a chore of it. (3) Be natural. You are not trying for an elocution medal. (4) When you stop reading, begin talking. Discussion is part of the enjoyment.

Library Cooperates
For those who missed Laughton's article, a copy has been posted near the door of the Roseburg Public library. And Miss Mitchell has arranged in the hallway a table of books for reading aloud. Among suggested titles are "The Best of Clarence Day," "We Followed Our Hearts To Hollywood," "This Is On Me," "Christmas Tales For Reading Aloud," "My Neck of the Woods," "Wheels in My Head," "Get A Horse," "Versus" and the Burns Mantle Play Selections of 1949-50 which include "Cocktail Party," "The Happy Time" and "The Member of the Wedding."

hospitals, and a spokesman said "nothing can be done for the child as far as present knowledge goes." Oh yes there is, said Mrs. Raymond Gerard of Bronx, N. Y. "I lost one baby two years ago thinking nothing could be done but my second child, Debra Ellen, is 13 and a half months old now and she had the disease, and is coming along fine."

Mrs. Eugene Kearns phoned to say her daughter, Teresa, 6, had the disease when she was a year and a half old but is thriving now.

Funds Assured

"We're just poor people," said Mrs. Kearns neighbor, Miss Marie Illus, but when you know others get better from this disease you want to do anything you can to help a child with it. If Mrs. Davis doesn't have any money, well, I'll go out fund-raising for her."

Mrs. Thomas Fusto telephoned to say her baby also had the disease when she was three months old and is two-and-a-half now and apparently well.

"If there is anything we can do for that little Oregon girl, we will," Mrs. Fusto said.

Dr. Andersen said she knew of physicians at the children's hospitals of San Francisco and Los Angeles who were as familiar with the malady as she.

The victim, she said, consists of feeding a true food that can be digested without the pancreas while new drugs "many times can control the lung infection."

Civic Harmony Given Emphasis At Bosses Dinner

"Unity In The Community" was the theme for the 25th annual "Bosses Dinner" given by the Business and Professional Women's club at the Umpqua hotel Monday night.

Speakers who used the topic to illustrate what unity could do for Roseburg were Harold Glover, Melvin Battee and Mayor Albert Flegel.

Glover, who spoke from the servicemen's standpoint, emphasized the extreme need for lack of selfishness on the home front if the fighting men in Korea are to be backed up with adequate weapons. There could be no unity of purpose, he pointed out, if sacrifices in the front lines were matched only with a profit-motive at home.

Battee spoke of Roseburg's future and the possibilities of building a larger and busier Roseburg on the now wasted by-products of the lumber mills. If a few militant ones will assume leadership, said Mr. Battee, others will unite in the common interest and bring these plans to fruition.

Official Harmony Noted

Harmony between the mayor's office, the city manager, and the council was emphasized by Mayor Albert Flegel as an important part of the esprit de corps of a city. Roseburg presents a united front to the world, said Mayor Flegel, in contrast to some cities where bitterness and hard feelings have impeded the smooth functioning of city management. He mentioned the many problems that have confronted the city council in the past months, such problems as the airport issue, the new fire truck, street naming, zoning, etc. These problems have all been solved, he said, but only presented a vote, the majority decision was accepted with good grace. It was Mayor Flegel's opinion that the interest shown in civic measures, the enthusiasm with which they have been fought out, and the willingness to accept the majority rule, are healthy signs in a fast-growing, active community like Roseburg.

Speakers for the evening were introduced by Mrs. Paul Geddes in musical dialogues to which she played the accompaniment on the organ. Following the dinner, guests and bosses attending were introduced by Hazel Smith. Mrs. Flossie Virden gave the welcome address. Mrs. Elynor Massey presided at the speakers table.

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Recreation Site Sought At Land Around Eel Lake

The Oregon Game commission will be asked to set aside its land holdings around Eel lake, south of Reedsport, for public recreation purposes.

Delegations from Coos and Douglas counties will appear before the commission at a meeting in Portland Friday to urge the recreational program.

Land surrounding the lake, situated on the Douglas-Coos coast highway, abutting the Oregon coast line, was purchased by the game commission about 12 years ago for the purpose of creating a cutthroat trout nursery project.

High summertime water temperature, however, caused the project to be abandoned. The City of Reedsport made application on the lake as a source of city water supply, supplementing the water of Clear lake, but the municipality recently withdrew its filing. The game commission has ordered sale of timber from its 1700-acre tract.

Development of the lake area for public recreational use was studied Monday by a group including Carl C. Hill, Days Creek, game commission chairman; James Vaughn, Roseburg regional game supervisor; John C. Diehl, president, and Craig Covey, president-elect of the Umpqua chamber of commerce; Charles V. Stanton, chairman, and John P. Amacher, both of Reedsport, representing the land acquisition committee of the Umpqua Basin Conservation council; Frank Calise, manager of the Coos Bay chamber of commerce; H. P. Hornish, editor of the Coos Bay Times, and Ralph Greenfield, game department resident biologist, Reedsport.

LIQUOR AGENT NAMED

Mrs. Ava McFarley has been appointed agent for the Oregon Liquor Control commission in Myrtle Creek, the commission announced this week. Her appointment becomes effective Dec. 15, when she replaces F. S. Chapin, who is resigning as agent.

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
