Unnatural Father Plans Fast, Prayer in Prison

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — "I intend to fast and pray until my name is cleared," said Leslie Jahn, 41, as he was ordered to San Quentin prison for incest involving his 15-year-old daughter.

The tennis professional appeared in court here on an appeal for modification of his one to 30-year sentence. He was convicted Oct. 26, 1949, of immoral relationships with Laura Lou Jahn, ranking amateur tennis player.

90th Anniversary Of Local Church To Be Celebrated

St. George's Episcopal church will celebrate the 90th anniversary of the consecration of its first church building in Roseburg this Sunday. The original building, which was torn down in 1939 when the present church was constructed, was built in 1869 on the present site, under the direction of the Rev. Thomas A. Hyland.

As part of the celebration there will be a special service of the Holy Communion Sunday, Dec. 3, at 11 a.m. Archdeacon Perry Smith will preach. The Rev. Alfred S. Tyson, Rector, will be the celebrant. The choir will sing for the anthem, "Long Has Thy Stood, O Church of God," by Lindeman, and the "Communion Service" by Healey Willson.

In addition to the Archdeacon several other former ministers of the local parish have sent letters of congratulation and best wishes, including those from the Rev. William L. Blaker, the Rev. H. R. White, retired Archdeacon, and the Rev. Barr G. Lee. Other priests formerly here are the Rev. John Dawson, retired in Portland, Rev. E. Potter Rannels at Cristobal, Panama Canal Zone, and the Rev. C. W. Baker at the City Mission in Los Angeles.

An interesting discovery was made in that the present bell was made in Troy, N. Y., and presented to the Roseburg church in 1890 by the Sunday school of St. Mark's church, West Orange, N. J.

The celebration will end Sunday evening with a potluck supper for the entire parish at 5:30 p.m. The Rev. A. H. MacDonnell of Ashland, dean of the Southern Oregon convocation, will be present at the supper, and will conduct the service of Communion.

Red Cross Work After Disaster Related At Club

Mrs. Myrtle Lytle, rehabilitation worker for the American Red Cross, was guest speaker at the Tuesday dinner meeting of the Roseburg Toastmistresses club. Mrs. Lytle discussed the work done following the emergency period of a disaster and explained the system whereby aid is provided for families that have suffered disaster losses.

Any necessary aid, such as blankets, food and clothing, is given without question during the disaster time, said Mrs. Lytle. Later, however, it is necessary to go more thoroughly into a family's economic status in order that aid money will be spent equitably.

Mrs. Harrison Winston's talk, "Gummy, A Legend," was a profile sketch of her husband's grandmother, Agnes Rice Winston, pioneer settler known throughout the Winston and Roseburg area as "Gummy." Mrs. Winston's biography included the Indian stories told by Gummy and her experiences as a small child growing up in the Rice Creek section.

Mrs. Dallen Jones was in charge of table topics. Each member spoke for one minute on "Curiosity." Mrs. Herman McInisoff was toastmistress for the evening and Mrs. Dan Dimick was critic.

country should expect all-out mobilization on the home front — tightened controls, possibly price and wage controls.

Mr. Truman replied that those matters are being given careful consideration.

MacArthur Defended

Asked about criticism of MacArthur growing out of the Chinese Communist invasion across the Manchurian border, the President said there are always people who are for a man when he's winning and who are ready to jump on him when there are setbacks.

MacArthur, he said, has done a good job.

A reporter said there had been criticism that MacArthur exceeded his authority and went beyond the point in Korea he was supposed to go.

General MacArthur, the President declared, did nothing of the kind.

The President also made clear that the policy against accepting the offer of Nationalist Chinese troops has not changed.

The offer was not accepted, he said, in the hope that such a course would prevent involvement of the world in a Third World War. That policy, he said, continues.

He said it still is the policy to keep Formosa neutralized. Formosa is the big island off the China coast where Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist government set up headquarters when forced by the Communists to flee the China mainland.

Mr. Truman denounced as a big lie complaints by some Republican senators that Secretary of State Acheson has tried to interfere with MacArthur's command in the far east. He said there was not a single word of truth in that.

Republican Senators Wherry of Nebraska, Bricker of Ohio and McCarthy of Wisconsin asserted last night that Acheson was trying to curb MacArthur.

CLEVELAND — (AP) — A divorcee waitress in the Greyhound restaurant here was raped and beaten to death early today.

Mrs. Pansy Whitley, 38, blood-smeared and gasping for breath, was found by two employees of the terminal in the locker room on Chester Ave. She died before a police ambulance arrived.

Homicide detectives were seeking an itinerant seen loitering around the terminal a short time before the crime was discovered. Mrs. Whitley's diamond engagement ring and wedding band were ripped from her fingers and her wrist watch was missing.

The detectives said the victim originally came from Charlotte, S. C., and has a 15-year-old son living there with his father.

The ban, okayed by the secretary of Agriculture, is effective in Klamath and Lake counties, Oregon, and Modoc and Siskiyou, California. Effect of the ban will be to put fewer locally-grown spuds on the market but the quality will be better. Idaho and central Oregon potato growers are shipping No. 2s.
