Pittsburgh Still Battling Snow

PITTSBURGH—(AP)—Armed national guardsmen continued to turn automobiles away from this city's industrial heart today so snow-clearing crews could finish unclogging main traffic arteries. The steel city began to assume a somewhat normal appearance again—except for the tinge of martial law—after a record breaking snowfall of 30.5 inches since last Friday.

The storm has left a toll of 42 dead, 19 in the greater Pittsburgh area. The frozen body of William Sandler, 76, was found by police near the doorway of his small home in nearby Wilkins township last night. Police said he had been dead several days.

Sub-freezing temperatures caused a thin glaze of ice to form on district streets and highways early today. Trucks, which had hauled snow all week started to haul cinders.

Most public transportation lines are operating on schedule again for shoppers and workers. However, some highways near Pittsburgh are drizzled with snow as the result of a high wind in the past 24 hours.

Main highways elsewhere in the state are passable for the most part.

Altoona, a city of 84,000, remained without electric power for 75 percent of its residents as the result of a sleet storm which tore down power lines last Saturday. More than 500 men are working around the clock to restore service.

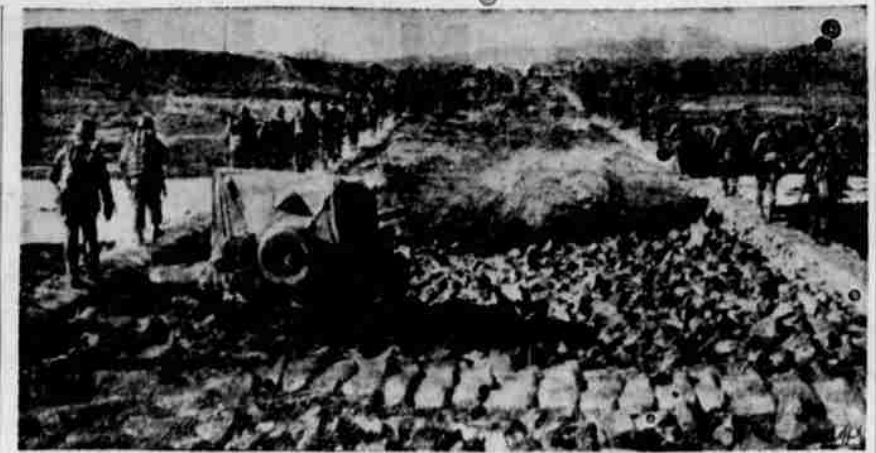

in handling the delicate international situation. Observers in Washington believe the prime minister also will explore with Mr. Truman the possibility of calling a secret high level meeting of the Western powers and Russia to end world tension. Such a meeting was urged in the House of Commons by Conservative leader Winston Churchill.

Attlee's decision to go to Washington was announced to Commons, whose members were alarmed by reports that Mr. Truman is contemplating use of the atom bomb in Korea.

The atom bomb reports from Washington also caused alarm in some Western European capitals, where leaders were reported to feel use of the bomb would signal the immediate start of World War III.

Attlee's announcement that he was going to talk with the President brought cheers. Before the prime minister spoke, about 100 Labor MP's had written him urging him to maintain a hands off policy on use of the atom bomb in Korea, emphasizing that Britain could not be committed to any action outside decisions of the U. N. and warn that any unilateral action would be followed by withdrawal of British forces in Korea.

Earl Browder, No. 1 Red, Jailed In Bond Default

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Earl Browder, longtime No. 1 American Communist, was jailed today after he failed to put up \$1,500 bond on a contempt of Congress charge.

Federal Judge Edward M. Curran turned down Browder's plea to remain at liberty on his personal bond. Browder was indicted earlier this week on the contempt charge for refusing to answer questions before a senate subcommittee during an investigation of communist-in-government charges of Senator McCarthy.

Judge Curran asked Browder whether he had an attorney and he said he didn't. Next he was asked whether he had any money to employ an attorney and he said "no." Asked whether he wanted the services of court-appointed counsel, Browder said he wishes to serve as his own attorney.

The station will also carry the game between Marshfield and Grant high school for the state prep grid class A title at Multnomah stadium tomorrow at 1:15 p. m.

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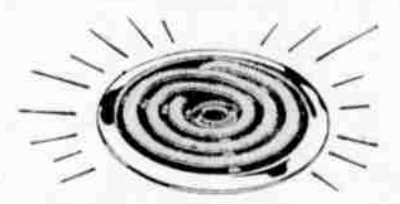
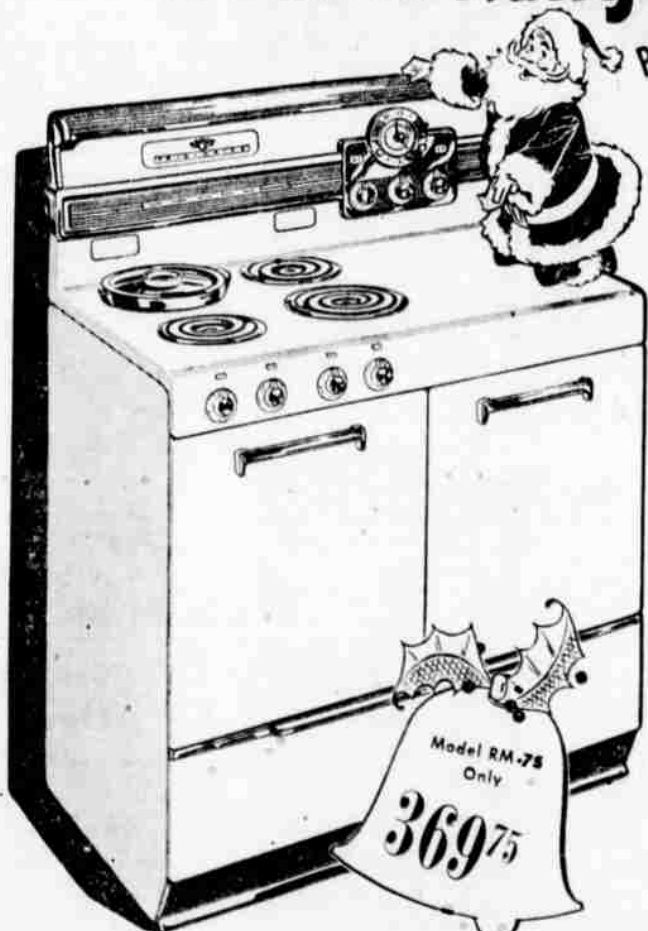
