E. T. Stack, Oregon Labor Head, Dies

PORTLAND — (AP) — E. T. Stack, 73, Oregon labor leader for two generations, died at his home here Thursday. He was born at Baker. From almost the beginning his life fell into a pattern of excitement. When a small child his parents secreted him in a wheat field to escape a roving band of Indians.

Turning to the cigar makers' trade as a young man, he quickly rose to a position of leadership in Portland and the state. Soon he was named to the national executive committee of which Samuel Gompers was a member. He and Gompers, the long-time head of the AFL, became close friends in the days when organized labor was having its first big growth.

Stack was a labor lobbyist in the state legislature during years when much of Oregon's labor legislation was drafted. During World

War I he was secretary of the Oregon State Federation of Labor. His surviving family includes Mrs. Stack and two sons, Laurence and Ivor of Portland; two sisters, Helen Stack and Katherine Fuchs, Baker; and a brother, Maurice, of San Diego.

Juvenile Jailed In Girl Murder

TRAIL, B.C. — (CP) — A 15-year-old high school girl was hanged to death with a double-bitted axe Wednesday night in the basement of her home here.

The victim was June Bradshaw, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. W. C. Bradshaw, who found the body in the cellar shortly after returning from a visit to friends. The blood-stained axe was close to the body.

Police arrested a 17-year-old juvenile at his home here. He is held for investigation.

An only daughter, June was alone in the house, and had been washing her hair in the kitchen when her parents left.

She had been slashed several times with the axe, and suffered numerous head wounds. Police said she had not been criminally assaulted.

A formal charge of murder was laid, and when the youth appeared in court he was remanded for eight days.

Mother Kills Children, Self By Fumes In Garage

ENGLEWOOD, N. J. — (AP) — A 29-year-old wife shepherded her

three small children into a closed garage last night and took their lives and her own with carbon monoxide fumes.

The bodies of socially prominent Mrs. Margaret Thompson Oppenheimer and the children, two of whom had been stricken with scarlet fever recently, were found slumped in the family station wagon by her husband, William.

Police listed the deaths as suicide and triple murder.

Oppenheimer is plant manager for the Archer Daniels Midland Vegetable Oils Co., of Edgewater. Police said Mrs. Oppenheimer left a note in the kitchen of the home but they did not disclose its contents.

Cheaper Prices For Eggs In 1951 Thought Unlikely

WASHINGTON — (AP) — You may be disappointed if you're expecting lower egg prices next year.

The government has announced that producer prices of eggs will not be supported next year.

The Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the Agriculture department says it's possible this may mean lower prices to housewives during the January-April period of 1951, compared to the same period this year, but that prices the latter part of the year — when production is lower — may be higher than this season.

The net result may be higher egg prices for the year as a whole.

This year's price support program kept eggs from dropping during the heavy season of production below an average of 25 cents a dozen for ungraded eggs in the midwestern area of surplus output. The support program also had a price-boosting effect on graded eggs in other areas.

With supports withdrawn, prices during the first half of next year may drop to such low levels that many farmers will sell off a lot of their hens. The result could be a much reduced laying flock in the latter part of the year, with egg production falling off and prices advancing sharply.

Furthermore, the bureau says the absence of price supports may lead farmers to raise fewer chickens.

Changed Concept Of Disease Given To Medical World

SALT LAKE CITY — (AP) — A new concept of disease was described at the College of Medicine of the University of Utah.

Some dramatic experiments show disease to be a battle between the body's connective tissues and germs or other causes of illness.

In the new concept, connective tissues furnish natural weapons to fight invasion by disease. These tissues even take part in healing cuts and bruises.

Connective tissue is the largest single material forming our bodies. Without it we would be jelly. This tissue takes many forms, from ligaments, membranes and the walls of blood vessels to the binding threads in fat, muscle and bone. Only hair and nails contain no connective tissue.

The experiments were done by Dr. T. F. Dougherty, professor of anatomy. He stopped inflammation of all sorts by giving extra amounts of the hormone cortisone. Cuts failed to swell or inflame. Redness of hives disappeared. Inflammation due to allergies disappeared.

This stopping of inflammation, Dr. Dougherty said, is not necessarily a good thing, and in fact may be very bad. He used large amounts of hormone to find out what was going on. Inflammation, he explained, is the body's first reaction to protect itself. Red and swollen tissues are the sign that white blood cells have rushed to the sites of trouble to phagocytize, or swallow, the germs or other substances causing trouble. This swelling is caused by the connective tissues. Cortisone stops the inflammation by acting directly on connective tissues.

The important discovery is this fact of direct action by cortisone on connective tissues. That changes the picture of body defense. It has been supposed that cortisone directly attacked the causes of the diseases for which this hormone is a remedy. But under the new concept cortisone goes to connective tissues to help those tissues minimize the strain on them by disease.

He said many stresses are taken by connective tissues. Burns, emotions, exercise, chills and getting tired all cause these stresses. Each stress causes a little of the hormone to be used up. When the hormone is too depleted, the defenses are temporarily lowered and disease can better get a foothold.

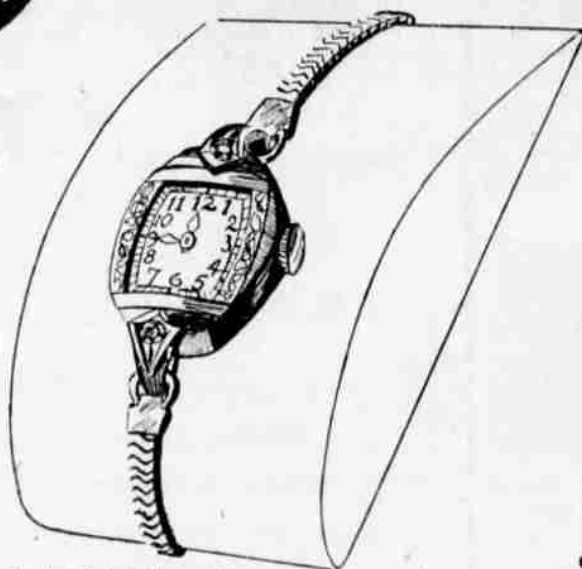
