Experienced Elkton Cage Team Seeks More Games

The Elkton basketball schedule has not been entirely completed according to Coach Carl Grimsrud. As it stands now only the league games and the entire December slate have been finished.

The Elks will test their ability for the first time tonight when they meet other teams in abbreviated "games" in the north half jamboree at Yoncalla. They will play their first full game Dec. 9 against Riddle. League play begins Dec. 15 when they travel to Drain. The next night, Dec. 16, they play host to the Roseburg Jayvees and on Dec. 29 they move to Creswell for a non-league tilt.

Eight Games
The Elks will play two games each against Drain, Yoncalla, Oakland and Glendale in the league — four at home and four away.

According to Grimsrud, the general prospects for the team this year are fair. He notes that the

team should be fairly strong on defense, and fair height and experience — but sadly lack consistent scoring punch.

From the experience angle Grimsrud has eight returning lettermen. The Elks are four deep in lettermen at the guard position. Charles Binder, a five-nine, two-year letterman is the most experienced man to turn out. Another senior guard is Wayne Cook at five feet, six inches. Carl Herabarger, one of the fastest men on the squad and easily the most consistent scorer last year, will not be able to start the season at his regular guard position because of a football injury. The other seven lettermen are five-foot, seven-inch Rinaldi Henderson, a sophomore who was a starter last year.

There are three returning forwards. Richard Mower, a one year letterman standing five-foot-eleven inches, will be playing his last year of high school basketball. For added height under the board, the Elks have one of last year's starters in Leland Cheever, a junior who is six-foot-one-inch tall. The other returning forward is David Scott, a five-foot, eleven-inch sophomore.

For the center position, the tallest man on the squad is John Beckley, a sophomore standing six feet, two inches.

Other candidates for the squad are sophomores Larry Emel and Kenneth Agee and freshmen Mike Benedict, Frank Gill and Douglas Demet.

Beaver Grid Schedule For 1951 Released

CORVALLIS — (AP) — Two inter-sectional opponents and eight Pacific Coast conference foes are on Oregon State college's 1951 football schedule. The 10-game slate provides no idle Saturdays between Sept. 22 and Nov. 24.

Opening at East Lansing against Michigan State, the Beavers' longest on consecutive Saturdays with Utah, Idaho at Spokane, USC at Los Angeles, Washington State, California at Berkeley, Washington at Seattle, UCLA at Portland, Stanford at Palo Alto and Oregon at Eugene.

Joe Culmone Sets Sights For All-Time Riding Mark

Jockey Joe Culmone, already holder of the modern day one-season riding record, set his sights today on Walter Miller's all-time mark of 358 winners set in 1906. Through yesterday Culmone has 354. He has one month left to get the 35 winners necessary to shatter Miller's mark.

Little Joe rode two winners at Bowie yesterday while his nearest rival, Willie Shoemaker, was blanked for the second straight day at Hollywood. Culmone, who several weeks ago, trailed Shoemaker by seven, now leads Willie by ten.

Oregon Turkey Output Decline In '51 Forecast

A 10 percent decline in Oregon's 1951 turkey production was forecast at Salem by Noel Bennion, Oregon State college poultry specialist.

Bennion told the annual fall meeting of the Oregon Turkey Improvement association that a check of turkey hatcherymen's intentions indicated that Oregon would produce 1,465,000 birds next year as compared with this year's 1,628,000 market birds.

A five percent turkey number cut is forecast by the USDA crop reporting service for the United States as a whole.

The survey also indicates that growers expect an average asking price of 29 cents per egg next spring. Hatcherymen expect to receive 70 cents apiece for newly hatched turkey poults. Both figures are about a three percent hike over 1950 receiving prices.

Oregon turkey breeders indicated they will cut their breeder hen carry-over by 25 percent. There were 259,000 breeder hens in Oregon this year. The survey shows an intent to carry over about 194,000 into the 1951 egg laying season.

CLUTCH PLAYER
Bob Cornelson, speedy OSC left halfback, was called on to start games only twice this fall but both times came through with flying colors. Against Montana he gained 57 yards in 10 tries and had one 64-yard touchdown run called back by a penalty. Filling in for injured Gene Tait in the Oregon battle, he picked up 122 yards on 23 attempts to help pace the Orange attack.

Mary Pickford Winner Of Film Contract Suit

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Screen producer Mary Pickford is upheld by the state district court of appeal in a \$1,633,750 suit brought against her by director Gregory La Cava for breach of contract. Two years ago Superior Judge Elmer W. Heald of Imperial county ruled in favor of Miss Pickford. The appellate court upheld the decision.

La Cava claimed Miss Pickford reneged on an agreement for his producing and directing a film version of "One Touch of Venus," a Broadway hit.

Unbeaten Skins Of Cadets, Sooners At Stake Saturday

NEW YORK — (AP) — Oklahoma and Army, ranked as the nation's two top college football teams, lay their unbeaten streaks on the line again tomorrow.

Oklahoma seeking its 31st straight victory, tangles with its arch rival, Oklahoma A&M before 40,000 at Stillwater, Okla. Army, seeking to extend its unbeaten string to 29 straight, meets Navy in the annual service classic before 100,000 at Philadelphia's municipal stadium.

Slim Grid Slate
These two games highlight a sparse national program that includes such traditional tilts as the Tennessee-Vanderbilt fray at Memphis and the Notre-Dame-Southern California clash at Los Angeles. The Miami (Fla.) vs. Missouri game tonight at Miami starts off the weekend activities following Texas' 17-0 victory over the Texas Aggies yesterday.

Oklahoma, already tapped for the Sugar bowl, and Army, which prefers not to play post season games, are heavy favorites. But Sooner Coach Bud Wilkinson and Earl Blaik of West Point are taking nothing for granted. Right now both would probably settle for one-point victories.

Sooners Approach Record
A victory for Oklahoma over the Aggies, followed by a Sugar bowl triumph over Kentucky, would give the Sooners 32 straight, within hailing distance of the all-time

straight of 34 set by Pennsylvania back in the gaslight era of the 1900's. Tennessee won 35 straight regular season games back in the 1930's, but lost two post-season games. Nothing would delight the Aggies better than to shatter the Sooners' streak.

That goes double for Navy against Army. Under similar circumstances two years ago the underdog Midshipmen tied the Cadets, 21-21, and five years ago dropped a 21-18 thriller. As a rule past records mean nothing in an Army-Navy struggle.

Tennessee, the nation's fourth ranked team and headed for a Cotton bowl clash with Texas, similarly may run into trouble against Vanderbilt. The Vols, fresh from their slight upset of Kentucky last week, are favored by two touchdowns.

Sectionally Important
The Pitt-Penn State game, originally scheduled last Saturday at Pittsburgh, but postponed because of storm conditions, is on tap tomorrow along with other sectionally important tussles. These include Louisiana State-Tulane, Mississippi State-Mississippi, North Carolina-Virginia, Rice-Baylor, Texas Christian-Southern Methodist, Maryland-Virginia Tech, Syracuse-Fordham, Kansas State-Wichita, and Richmond-William and Mary.

Grand Champion Steer Sells For \$12 A Pound

CHICAGO — (AP) — Hotelman Albert Pick paid a record high \$12 a pound for "Big Spring Special," the grand champion steer of the 1950 International Livestock exposition. Auctioning of the 1,025-lb. Texas Hereford thus brought an additional \$12,300 for its 19-year-old owner, Lloyd Robinson of Big Spring, Tex.

The steer weighed 1,075 when it was crowned grand champion, but after numerous parades around the show ring, its auction-time weight was officially corrected to 1,025.

The white-faced steer, which cost Robinson \$140, already had brought him \$1,150 in prize money after it was crowned grand champion Tuesday.

The previous record price was \$11.50 a pound, paid for the 1949 grand champion steer, another Texas-raised Hereford.



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
