**De Paur Chorus To Appear Here On Friday Night**

The first important concert attraction to spring from World War II, the De Paur's Infantry chorus, will be heard here on Friday, Dec. 8, at 8 p. m. in the junior high school auditorium under the auspices of the Roseburg Community Concert association. The timely veterans, who sang for American troops from Iwo Jima to Bad Nauheim, remained together as a unit under Capt. Leonard de Paur's direction and are now making their third civilian concert tour of more than 100 concerts under the auspices of F. C. Coppicus and F. C. Schanz of Columbia Artists' management. The De Paur Chorus, organized within the 372nd Infantry regiment at Fort Dix, N. J., in 1942, gave more than 2000 concerts for American armed forces while in the service, visiting every theatre of war during the course of their three year travels. No island was too small, no outpost too remote for the singing infantry men. Sometimes they gave six performances a day—in hospital wards, on the decks of battleships, at hidden bomber bases, at drab supply stations other groups had passed by. To the men of the armed forces this chorus of singing soldiers was a memorable attraction and it was their enthusiasm that inspired the singers' decision to stay together as a concert unit after the war. Part of the repertoire to be heard here is made up of music of the many lands the ex-soldiers visited. Service men who heard them during the war told the singers they would like the folks back home to hear the programs, which also include service songs of World War II as well as contemporary classics, spirituals and songs of different faiths.

**68c Deposit of 27 Years Ago Now \$1 To Stay Alive**

WESTFIELD, Mass.—(AP)—Movie actor Wendell Corey is mighty proud of the 68 cents he earned shoveling snow the day before Christmas 27 years ago. He deposited the money in a local bank—and has taken steps to protect it. Corey once lived here. Under a new Massachusetts law, the state may claim bank accounts left inactive for more than 14 years. Corey forwarded 32 cents to the bank to make it an even buck and keep the account alive. Now that it has reached a round dollar it will start drawing interest.

**Suit Considered To Force Screen In Dam Intake**

PORTLAND — (AP) — The State Game commission says it is considering court action against the Grants Pass irrigation district for refusal to screen the intake of the Savage rapids dam.

Charles Lockwood, state game director, said staff members would report later on what action to take in the matter.

An aide said the commission hoped to settle the matter without going to court.

"In our opinion the Grants Pass irrigation district board has not acted in good faith," Lockwood said.

"Studies by our fishery agents have already established the tremendous loss of young steelhead and salmon which takes place annually in the pump and turbine system intake at Savage rapids dam. The irrigation district board has a
