Spiritual Life Within Declared Church Problem

CLEVELAND — (AP) — Delegates to the constitutional convention of the newly-formed National Council of Churches of Christ headed for their homes today, and with them went their president's plea for a church of "deep conviction and spiritual experience."

"The churches can only be as strong as there is strength and peace," declared the Rt. Rev. Henry Sherrill of Greenwich, Conn., presiding bishop of the Protestant Episcopal church. The first president of the council, he spoke at the convention's closing session at the convention's closing session at the convention's closing session at the convention's closing session.

"The real problem which confronts the churches," he said several hundred delegates, "is not the strength of the enemy without, but the quality of the spiritual life within."

Sherrill also called for a church "extended and applied to every aspect of life."

"There can be no artificial division between the sacred and the secular. The gospel has to do with international relations, with peace or war, with the atom bomb, with economic conditions, with family life, for nothing human can be alien to the love of God in Christ. Field Embraces All Life."

"The churches, if they are expressions of the purpose and will of God, cannot be limited to special fields of worship."

"For if worship is real, then action must follow — for all of life belongs to God. Once we have the conviction that there is a saving gospel, then that gospel must be extended and applied to every aspect of life."

The greatest tragedy of the world, he said, "is that God is forgotten."

"With the terrible experience of the past three decades, when we should have learned the actual truth, still we fall even in despair to feed the supreme warning and lesson of our times, that all our striving, our planning and labor are in vain without God."

Council Birth Costly

The new national council unites the work of 31,000,000 American protestants and eastern orthodox communicants in 150,000 of the nation's individual churches.

Its birth was a costly business. The budget for the council's first full year, 1951, is \$2,604,682 the minimum figure. This is well below the 1950 total budget for the agencies which the National Council replaces. That figure was \$3,612,146.

But, because of leases and shifting of headquarters, the true savings by the streamlined National Council will not be fully felt until 1952.

The cost of the first general assembly, for instance, unofficially has been estimated at \$800,000.

This leaves a tremendous field of fund-raising for the council and it's 80-member lay committee.

Perle Mesta Tops Poll In American Women Of Year

NEW YORK — (AP) — Woman of the Year for 1950, as named by an Associated Press poll of newspaper women's editors, is Perle Mesta, U. S. minister to Luxembourg.

The poll is conducted annually on a basis of headline interest. Since Mrs. Mesta's appointment in 1949, she has devoted herself seriously to her job in the little country.

The famous Washington hostess has been recalled to the spotlight also this year by the current smash hit on Broadway, "Call Me Madam," in which Ethel Merman portrays the "Lady Ambassador to Lichtenburg," proclaimed "stily as 'the hostess with the mostes' on the ball."

For her success in the hit musical, Miss Merman is voted the year's outstanding woman of the stage, with a few votes nominating her as woman of the year.

Others Listed Tops

Others voted outstanding in various fields include:

MOVIES: Gloria Swanson, by almost unanimous vote, for her comeback in "Sunset Boulevard."

LITERATURE: Pearl S. Buck, first woman to win the Nobel prize, in 1938. Her moving article, "The Child Who Never Grew," based on the life of her own daughter, created a sensation this year.

SPORTS: Gussy Moran, who won headlines for unorthodox dress on the tennis courts.

RADIO: Mary Margaret McBride, who recently switched her popular interview program from NBC to ABC.

BUSINESS: Vivien Kellems, Stonington, Conn., manufacturer whose continuing fight against withholding income taxes from her employees has made her a thorn in the side of Uncle Sam. She waged an unsuccessful campaign for the Republican senatorial nomination in Connecticut this year.

MUSIC: Margaret Truman, daughter of the President, continuing her concert career.

EDUCATION: Millicent Carey McIntosh, dean of Barnard college and mother of five.
