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Plywood Plant Will Rise At Winchester

Harder, who has been employed in the Western Veneer company's plant at Sweet Home.

James E. Slattery, Roseburg, who has resigned from the Bureau of Land Management after 12 years as district supervisor, will be in charge of timber procurement.

Robert Wise, Eugene, will expedite construction and materials.

Aside from key men, local labor will be employed exclusively. Jones reports. Operation is expected to start with about 50 employees. Two and three shifts will be arranged as rapidly as possible.

When machinery for fabrication is installed, it is expected that maximum employment will reach approximately 250 persons.

The Roseburg plant, Jones states, will be designed to produce 50 million square feet of three-eighths plywood, annually, utilizing 24 million board feet of logs.

The company plans to obtain re-logging contracts on land once cut over and will arrange logging and hauling through independent operators. This is the same system the company has followed during its five years of successful operation.

It is now salvaging about 40 million board feet of timber annually in the Eugene-Lebanon area. It is anticipated that from 10 to 15 small logging shows will be constantly maintained in this area.

Anticipating complete usage of all material, the Roseburg plant, Jones states, will burn oil to produce steam, rather than trying to operate from mill refuse.

Oregon Decency Credit Extended To Newspapers

PORTLAND — (AP) — Oregon Advertising club members toasted the Oregonian here and "the merchants who advertised in it to make it strong and financially independent" in its first century.

Members were honoring the newspaper which this month began its second century of publication.

Frank Jenkins, publisher of the Herald and News, Alameda Falls, told the group that Oregon is "the dearest state left in the union" and said newspapers like the Oregonian are the reason.

"For 100 years the Oregonian has been telling the people of Oregon about their neighbors. Any man elected to office in Oregon would be ashamed to depart from the highest concept of decency and honesty, because everybody in Oregon would know about it," Jenkins said.

"Only a good newspaper can have that effect, because only a good newspaper has the facilities to talk to all the people."

The southern Oregon publisher said he believes that if the nation survives the perils of this era it will be "because of the residue of common ordinary horse-sense that exists in the people because of the talking for 100 years of such papers."

"A newspaper's duties are to tell the news, tell what the news is about, and to tell what you think ought to be done about it," Jenkins added.

Walter W. R. May of the Oregon City Enterprise-Courier, was toastmaster for the program.

Americans' Yule Tree Expenditure \$50 Million

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Americans will spend more than \$50,000,000 for Christmas trees this year. This estimate forecasting the sale of 28,500,000 trees was made by the Agriculture department.

The department said this season's supply will equal last year's, and that prices are likely to be about the same.

The agency said about 21,500,000 trees will be cut in this country and about 7,000,000 imported from Canada. Montana leads the states in tree production, providing about one seventh of the country's cut.
