production must be speeded up. Loss of strategic materials to the iron curtain countries must be brought under tighter control.

There will be no voluntary withdrawal of American or British forces from Korea — meaning that if they do withdraw it will be under irresistible Communist military pressure. This assumes there will be no negotiated agreement.

There will be no appeasement of communist aggression in Korea, but there has been no official explanation of what is meant by "appeasement."

The U. S. and Britain will back the move pending in the United Nations calling on Chinese Communists to end their intervention in Korea.
