Value Of Taxable Property Listed

The total value of taxable property in Oregon is \$1,607,876,262 as reported in the summary of all assessment rolls published recently by the State Tax commission in a bulletin by the League of Oregon Cities. This represents an increase of 4.3 percent in the assessed valuation of the state for property tax purposes or an increase of \$68,847,191 over the 1949 total of \$1,539,029,071. Of the total reported, \$1,343,299,271 represents property that was assessed by the county assessors and equalized by the county boards of equalization and \$264,576,985 is public utility properties assessed, equalized and apportioned by the State Tax commission.

The value of real property as shown by the tax commission summary of assessment rolls is \$1,011,877,864, and the value of personal property is \$336,827,805, which are reduced by the amount of \$5,678,562 because of veteran and widow exemptions.

Multnomah county leads in assessed valuation with \$608,796,279, followed by Lane county with \$314,437,088. Clackamas county is third

with \$275,563,610, and Marion county is fourth with \$172,770,809. Wheeler county has the least assessed valuation with \$4,222,238. Other counties with low valuations are Curry with \$6,206,427 and Crook with \$8,278,134.

The 1950 assessed valuation of Lane county has increased 20.6 percent over the 1949 valuation; the valuation of Douglas county has increased 11.1 percent; Clatsop, 9.4 percent; and Jefferson, 9.3 percent. Five counties—Klamath, Polk, Tillamook, Wallowa, and Wheeler—have had a decrease in assessed valuation, varying from a decrease of .41 percent in Wheeler county to 0.4 percent in Polk county.
