A two-week search by army and CAA ships failed to discover the wreckage.

Portland Mayor Raps State Civil Defense Plans

PORTLAND — (AP) — Mayor Dorothy McCullough Lee has rapped a plan outlined this week at Salem on Oregon civil defense procedure. She said she had made a protest at the meeting but had agreed to say nothing about it until Gov. Douglas McKay had reached a decision. Then, she said, she found that it had been reported in the press.

"I gathered from the governor he didn't want me to discuss it," she said. "Did they try to seal my lips and then rush to the Salem newspapers and correspondents and give them their version of it?" Under the plan outlined at the meeting, attended by officials including representatives of the state police and the County Sheriff's association, cities and other disaster areas would first call on their own counties for needed help, then go to the state for aid if necessary. Police Sgt. H. G. Malson was reported as saying that a call to the state for additional law enforcement help would bring either direct state police aid or help from neighboring communities.

"Actually," the Mayor said, "they were discussing only law enforcement but I gathered this plan was to be the pattern for all civil defense aid."

She said that was a new procedure, substituting a direct call to the state for previously planned mutual aid pacts between counties.

Communism Unwanted In China, Missioner Says

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — A missionary returning from China believes a little American aid would go a long way in overthrowing Communist rule in south China. Revolts against Communists are common there, and not five percent of the people really want communism, said the Rev. Ezra L. Langway, who arrived here from Shanghai. He has spent 32 years in China for the Seventh-day Adventist church.

With American support, he said, Nationalists could take all territory south of the Yangtze river in six months.

Defies Gunman's Order To Avoid Soiling Suit

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Betty Jean Bandell, 21, was wearing a new suit when a gunman walked into the drugstore where she was shopping. Ordered to lie on the floor, she snapped: "I won't. I just paid \$75 for this suit and I don't want to get it dirty. She got away with it—and the gunman got away with \$500. His soft-heartedness, however, put the holdup man in jail. Miss Bandell got a good look at him and was able to identify a suspect arrested later by sheriff's deputies.
