New Federal Beef Grades Released

SAN FRANCISCO—(CP)—New federal beef grades go into effect Friday, Floyd Forbes, president of the Western States Meat Packers association, said the changed grades would appear on retail meat counters almost immediately.

The change in grades, he added, will not affect prices, and the present prime and choice grades, which together make up about 10 percent of all beef sold, will be combined under the name of "prime."

The present "good" grade will be called "choice."

Smaller-sized cuts from young animals, formerly included under "commercial" grade, will be called "good."

The rest of the "commercial" grade, meat from more mature animals, utility, cutter and canner grades, are unchanged.

Forbes said "these beef grading changes bring the grades in line with changes which have occurred since grades were first established 23 years ago."

Meats Join Price Trends Upward During This Week

Retail prices of many foods pushed higher this week as cold weather spread across most of the nation, whetting appetites and stimulating holiday food buying.

In meats, even higher prices appeared likely in the next few days, reflecting advances at major livestock markets where snowstorms delayed or reduced shipments.

Virtually the only meat item to show any notable downward trend was smoked hams, trimmed, two to four cents a pound in many stores.

Top grade eggs were unchanged to five cents a dozen lower in most places as wholesale prices eased a little more following their sharp break a couple of weeks ago.

"Duckens and turkeys held about unchanged from last week. Some lamb cuts were off a shade in scattered sections, but retail meat sources said higher wholesale quotations indicated an upward trend in consumer prices. Beef a four cent items were up two to four cents a pound.

Higher in most produce departments were beets, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, yellow globe onions, cauliflower, cucumbers, peppers and spinach. The only vegetables generally lower were snap beans and green and yellow squash.

Butters trend upward. Butter was working higher in many cities following word that the Agriculture department had suspended sales of its butter holdings to find out how much it had left. The government's stock of butter, acquired under the price-support program, had dwindled from nearly 200,000,000 pounds in mid-summer to around 70,000,000 last week as distributors bought large quantities.

Some trade authorities say this sharp cut in surplus butter stocks may result in a price jump, considering the only thing that has held down prices has been the government's willingness to sell its holdings at comparatively low quotations.

The Agriculture department this week announced it will allow marketing of 8,000,000 tons of sugar in the U. S. in the new year—150,000 tons more than estimated consumption in 1950.

The department's production and marketing administration headlined pork and sweet potatoes on its list of plentiful foods for strictly buying this week.

Here's the administration's national list of foods likely to be relatively low-priced in January because of abundant supplies: apples, oranges, grapefruit, cranberries, potatoes, onions, sauerkraut, pork, broiling chickens, frozen fish fillets, shrimp, cottage cheese, peanut butter and honey.

Richmond Leads Class Of Cities In Census Gain

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Richmond, Calif., led all cities with 25,000 or more population in the 1950 census in rate of growth, the census bureau reports.

Richmond had 23,642 persons listed in 1940 and gained 319.7 percent by showing 99,218 in 1950.

The only Pacific northwest city on the list was Vancouver, Wash. It was 13th in percentage of gain among cities of 25,000 and up. It gained 120 percent in growing from 28,788 to 41,449.

Pork Now Good For Your Budget

Our present pork crop is the third largest in history—so let's make the most of that budget situation.

Pork and Vegetable Pie (4 servings)

Two-thirds cup carrots, 2-3 cup cubed potatoes, 1 small onion, sliced, meat, gravy, 1 cup cooked pork, rich biscuit dough.

Cook the vegetables in boiling salted water until almost tender. Drain. Add some of the cooking liquid to the gravy if needed to make about 1 1/2 cups. Mix vegetables, pork and gravy together. Heat thoroughly and pour into a baking pan. Make a rich biscuit dough with 1 cup sifted flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 3/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup fat and about 1 1/2 cup milk or cream in 1 1/2 cup dough. Cut biscuits and arrange on top of meat mixture. Bake at hot oven (425 degrees F.) until biscuits are done and pie is hot—about 15 minutes.

Potatoes, too, are plentiful. So add 100 kolo nga aplooo auq are tad salad.

Hot Potato Salad (4 servings)

Three tablespoons fat, 1 cup finely chopped onions, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1/2 cup dry mustard, 3 tablespoons vinegar, 3 tablespoons water, 2 tablespoons sweet pickle relish, 1-3 cup diced celery, 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper, 2 1/2 cups diced cooked potatoes.

Heat the fat and brown the onions lightly in it. Mix flour, salt, sugar and mustard and stir in. Add vinegar and water slowly, stirring constantly, and cook until thick. Mix pickle relish, celery and green pepper with potatoes. Add the hot dressing and mix lightly, but thoroughly. Turn into baking dish, cover and heat in oven at 350 degrees F. (moderate) about 20 minutes.
