Oregon Draft Boards Face Class Scarcity

PORTLAND — (AP) — Oregon draft boards by May or June may scrape the bottom of the barrel of 19 to 25-year-old men classified 1-A.

Col. Francis W. Mason, deputy state director of selective service, said the Multnomah county board was already reaching for 20-year-olds after exhausting the available 21 to 25-year-old 1-A group.

He reported the March quota for the state would be 750 to 775 men. Jackson county selective service board chairman Guy Applewhite reported not enough men to fill pending quotas. Applewhite said there were less than 100 class 1-A men in that county for January-February calls. Mason said this condition was not general.

The deputy director said many young men held induction postponements because of college attendance. This will change in June, he said.

Fatal Gun Play Due To Jealousy

PITTSBURGH — (AP) — A railroad fireman Thursday night forced his way into a home where he once lived and shot to death a nine-year-old boy, police Chief Nick Antonelli of McKees Rocks said.

Antonelli identified the assailant as Eugene Miller, 42.

He said Miller wounded himself and two other persons, one of them a child of three.

The slain boy was Henry John Rost.

Antonelli said Miller went on his shooting rampage apparently out of jealousy. He said Miller had threatened Mrs. Isabella Lober, who lives in the house, after she refused to see him.

As reported by Antonelli, Miller first shot Mrs. Lober's 49-year-old husband, Walter, injuring him seriously, and then fired twice at Mrs. Lober herself who with her small son and the Rost boy fled toward the back of the house.

One shot struck the Rost boy, a distant relative of Mrs. Lober, and the second hit the younger child, Mrs. Lober was uninjured.

Miller then wounded himself in the head.

He was charged with murder, and a police guard placed over him at the hospital.

Tail-Biting Custom Not Approved In Canada

WINDSOR, Ont. — (AP) — The Poles in Poland may bite the tails off kittens, but Nicholas Kozubiak is spending five days in jail to realize it's not the custom here.

Kozubiak was hauled before Magistrate J. A. Hanrahan for using his teeth to detail three small felines. That's common practice in Kozubiak's homeland, Poland.

"Whatever is the practice in Poland, I don't intend to put a stamp of approval on it here," replied the judge, meting out the five-day sentence.

DEATH THREAT ALLEGED

Elvin Maurice Hubbard, 49, of Roseburg is being held in the county jail on \$1,500 bail charged with threatening the commission of a felony, reported Justice of Peace A. J. Gettles.

According to the complaint, Hubbard, the accused, threatened to kill his father, E. A. Hubbard. He was arrested by the deputy sheriff.

Forest Research Report Deals With Fir And Pine

then gives way, to ponderosa and sugar pines.

The present forest service practice of clear-cutting small tracts and planting them will permit the replacing of the present mixed stands with pines, on those sites where pines outproduce fir, he said. Even though fir seeds in naturally, it will be unable to overtake the pines, once they are established.

Hayes cited two examples of record pine growth in southern Oregon. One was a sugar pine from the South Umpqua area, which measured 246 feet, felled, tying the record height of a sugar pine giant found in California.

The other was a ponderosa pine in an exceptional stand in Myers valley, about 25 miles southwest of Grants Pass. The specimen measured 22 feet longer than the record 232 feet.

Woods also lifted controls from unincorporated localities in Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington counties in Oregon and Clark county, Washington.

Controls also were lifted from all incorporated communities in Multnomah county, including Fairview and Troutdale.

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Truman Approves Yugo Aid Money

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman today signed legislation providing an additional \$38,000,000 in food aid for drought-stricken Yugoslavia.

The fund raises to approximately \$69,000,000 the amount of American assistance to the Balkan nation, which is Communist ruled but is at odds with Russia.

Mr. Truman had asked congress for the money to avert a famine as a result of a Yugoslav crop failure. He also said it was needed "to help preserve the independence of a nation which is defying the savage threats of Soviet imperialists."

Congress will not have to appropriate any new money for the program.

Actually, the bill authorizes the diversion of \$50,000,000 in Marshall plan funds to Yugoslavia. But \$12,000,000 in recovery funds, plus \$6,000,000 in import-export bank loans and approximately \$13,000,000 in military aid funds, already has been made available to the Yugoslavs.

Shipments of food, grain and other supplies started flowing into Yugoslavia in November. The military aid money was used only to provide food for Marshall Tito's army of 30 to 32 divisions, the largest standing armed force in Europe outside Russia.
