H. T. Hansen, local automobile dealer, sits at his desk at the Roseburg Motor company gazing appreciatively at a reproduction of a noted painting of Pontiac, famous Ottawa war chief and for whom, incidentally, one of General Motors' cars is named.

Pontiac flourished (1 quote from an authority who used the verb) from about 1620 to 1689. Corn And Wheat Limits Removed By Secy. Brannan

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Secretary of Agriculture Brannan has lifted all planting restrictions on 1951 crops of corn and wheat.

This action was taken he said because of maximum production of these important bread and livestock feed grains is needed under the national mobilization program.

The announcement is a reversal of former decisions. The department had set up acreage planting allotments for the 1951 wheat crop. It also had announced that such allotments would be continued, but at higher levels than in 1950, for corn.

Suspension of restrictions will affect only the spring wheat portion of the wheat crop, because winter wheat already has been planted under individual allotments to farmers. Winter wheat makes up about 70 percent of wheat production.

Last year's corn crop, eight percent above average, was grown on the smallest acreage since 1894. The wheat crop, above average, was grown on a slightly above average acreage.

"This call for increased acreage for wheat and corn," Brannan said, "does not mean for a call for plow-up of acreages that from the standpoint of conservation might better be left in hay or pasture and other essential crops."

Roseburg School District Able To Qualify For Junior College, Legislators Report

Fourteen school districts of Oregon have the necessary tax valuation and sufficient high school enrollment to warrant early consideration for the establishment of junior college programs, the legislative interim committee on post-high school educational facilities points out in a report released here by State Senator Thomas Parkinson.

The report, authorized by Senate joint Resolution 26, is a 66-page document calling for early consideration of junior college programs in the following districts: Baker, Milwaukie, Oregon City, Roseburg, Medford, Grants Pass, Klamath Falls, Springfield, Albany, Lebanon, Gresham, Beaverton, Hillsboro, and Portland.

The two criteria stipulated by the interim committee are: (1) an assessed property valuation of at least \$7,500,000 and (2) an enrollment of 500 in grades nine through twelve.

With the theme that "the state is still permitting the accident of birthplace to play too big a part in determining a young person's chances of receiving the benefits of higher education," the report is packed with statistics to point up the thesis that a far greater percentage of students attend college where facilities are easily accessible, than attend from areas not offering low-cost education.

The breadth of service for the proposed junior colleges is treated by the report: "The Junior College serves three groups: (1) the group preparing to enter college; (2) the larger group who wish to prepare for trade, industry, or other vocation; and (3) the adults of the community who desire to better equip themselves for positions in the business world or to advance culturally."

Proposed Law Summarized

The text of the proposed junior college law has the following features:

"1. The proposed law provides for the establishment of junior colleges as a part of the secondary school system to be administered by the local school district and be financed by the joint efforts of the district and state—the amount of state aid to be the same as now allotted for the public elementary and secondary schools of the state.

"2. The proposed law establishes two criteria for determining whether or not a school district shall be authorized to establish a junior college: (1) an enrollment of 500 or more students in grades IX-XII, and (2) an assessed valuation of \$7,500,000 or more.

"3. The proposed law provides for supervision of the junior colleges at the state level, comparable to the now existing for the public schools of the state with the added provision that the approval of the state board of higher education shall be obtained for those courses which are to be recognized for credit by standard colleges and universities.

"4. The proposed law also establishes the procedure which must be followed by those districts contemplating offering junior college work.

"The proposed law also authorizes the local school district to charge tuition for both resident and non-resident students, the amount of such tuition charge to be left to its own determination but not to exceed \$150 per year for resident students."

Evangelist Sees Good In Bomb Threat To N.Y.

NEW YORK — (AP) — Evangelist Billy Graham, 32, says "it took an atom bomb threat to make the city (New York) talk about God."

The Southern Baptist minister, speaking before 700 persons who met to plan a city-wide evangelistic campaign for 1952, asked for a "fanatical following" among Christians similar to that shown by Communists.

He said that New York City was on the brink of atomic destruction and called for Christian unity "before it is too late."

"I do not know any place more ripe for judgment or closer to the brink of catastrophe than the city of New York," he declared.

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
