

Blood Typing Begun Every Person In Industry To Be Reached In Program

The Douglas county health department this week began the herculean task of typing blood of persons in every industry and union in the area.

The department, working in conjunction with the civil defense blood typing program, started operations in the Dillard area Monday and to date has typed 176 persons. Of this total, 103 were from the Ford Lumber Co. at Dillard, 32 from the Thomas Lumber Co. and 41 from the Hult Lumber Co.

Tuesday, Jan. 14 typing will be done at the Firmeo plant at Myrtle Creek. On Wednesday, in cooperation with the Veterans administration, the department will type teachers and their families in school district 4. Thursday, the St. Helens Lumber Co. is scheduled in the morning and E. K. Wood Lumber Co. in the afternoon. To round out the week, all county house employees and their families will be typed Friday.

Slated for the week of the 22nd are Ford Lumber Co. of Roseburg, Youngs Bay Lumber Co. and a recent trip to Firmeo of Myrtle Creek. Somewhere in the crowded week, the county unit will squeeze in the Dillard school teachers and families.

It was noted by County Health Officer Dr. E. J. Wainwright, that many people have the misconception that this is a blood donor program. It is not, he said, but rather a typing program for protection of each individual and the community as a whole. He continued that each person whose blood has been typed will receive a card to be carried on his person with information of the type and RH factor of his blood. In addition, a list of all those typed will be filed with each hospital in the county to be used in case of an emergency.

Martin Succeeds Kline On O & C Advisory Board

Included among them are timberland owners, loggers, both small and large sawmill operators, labor, agricultural, mining, local government, recreational groups and the general public.

Martin will represent the plywood and timber industry in the Roseburg district.

Oregon Payrolls Top Billion-Dollar Mark

SALEM — (P) — Payrolls of the 17,000 Oregon firms passed the billion-dollar mark in 1950 for the first time, the State Unemployment Compensation commission estimated today.

The total is 50 firms covered by the law.

The previous record payroll was \$975,000,000 in 1948, compared with \$948,000,000 in 1949.

The commission said its figures for 1950 will be available in a few weeks.

Employment in December totaled 451,700, excluding farm work. This compares with 455,800 in November, and 419,900 in December, 1949.

There were 81,600 persons working last month in lumber and logging industries, which was 6,000 more than in November, but 13,000 less than in December, 1949.

Teamsters Reelect Brady To Head Joint Council

Other officers elected were: R. R. Mikesell, Vancouver, Wash., vice president; E. S. Benjamin, Salem, recording secretary; A. O. GARRISON, Portland, secretary-treasurer; and C. C. Evanson, Portland; Don Stansell, Medford; and Ward Graham, Salem trustees.

Evanson is the only new officer, the others having been reelected.

Solons Criticize Lack Of Controls To Halt Inflation

WASHINGTON — (P) — Congress members today coupled sharp criticism of the administration's handling of the wage-price problem with praise for President Truman's stiff tax-boost call.

One of the strongest blasts at the wage-price control issue came from Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.), chairman of the senate-house economic committee, who usually is an enthusiastic supporter of White House policy on such matters.

He declared the economic report which Mr. Truman sent to Congress yesterday "contains appalling evidence of the progress of inflation" but "no record of any positive steps taken as yet to hold the line against inflation."

O'Mahoney called for immediate and general wage-price controls and said failure to act now "could be disastrous" to the nation's economy and security. His theme of criticism was voiced too, by Senator Humphrey (D-Minn.) and several Republicans.

The President, in his economic report, told Congress that government staffs are being gathered to apply "broader controls" over prices and wages. At present controls are in effect only in the automobile industry.

"In the case of prices," Mr. Truman said, "the general policy must be to hold the price line with the utmost vigor."

Senator Ives (R-N.Y.) said the President has been "derelict in setting up controls under the authority which Congress gave him months ago." Ives added that under the circumstances "it ill behooves him (the President) to call for the utmost vigor."

Senator Capohart (R-Ind.) also demanded that wage-price controls be imposed across the board immediately. So did Senator Bricker (R-Ohio).

O'Mahoney announced that the joint economic committee which he heads will hold public hearings on the general situation starting Jan. 23. He said the government witnesses would include Charles E. Wilson, director of defense mobilization; Alan Valentine, economic stabilization chief; and Michael V. DiSalle, price administrator.

Sales Tax Plan To Aid Schools Will Be Studied

A resolution regarding a sales tax for the benefit of the schools was presented by Paul Flury at the Douglas County Farm Bureau federation meeting Monday afternoon at the Hotel Umpqua.

The resolution was presented by the North Douglas center and will be sent out to the various centers in the county for their action.

Flury also reported on what livestock members might expect if they decide to unite in shipping their own live stock.

He read a letter he had received from the Valley Marketing association, which offered its cooperation with the farmers of Douglas county.

Paul Newman resigned as county dairy commodity chairman, as he is leaving to reside in southern California. He reported that the Grants Pass Dairy association had voted to go along with Douglas county in raising the minimum butterfat content in retail milk from 3.2 to 3.8 percent butterfat content.

Joy Brumbach reported there would be a livestock meeting Jan. 16, 17 and 18 in Grants Pass at the Redwood hotel, and that he would attend. There will be a livestock meeting of the Douglas Livestock association in Roseburg Jan. 15.

Mrs. R. M. Crawford of Yoncalla was appointed Associated Women's chairman for Douglas county to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Mrs. Joe Brumbach. Mrs. Brumbach said she did not have time to attend to the state meetings required.

J. Roland Parker, county agricultural agent, was a guest and gave advice on various matters during the meeting.

Huge Chemical Plant Started In Northwest

VANCOUVER, Wash. — (P) — Construction of a \$2,000,000 plant to manufacture hydrogen peroxide for military uses was a step nearer after ground-breaking ceremony here.

The Buffalo Electric-chemical company will build the two-story plant to produce hydrogen peroxide for use, among other things, as rocket fuel and for jet-assisted takeoff units on planes.

An abundant supply of water and power brought the plant here, G. C. Crewson, the company's chief engineer, said.

With a payroll of about 150 to start, the plant will require some 6,000 kilowatts of Bonneville power, Crewson said. It is designed so it can easily be doubled in size.

fire this week. Several legislators criticized the law on grounds it takes away the department head's right to hire and fire, as well as his right to fix salaries.

One senator, Thomas R. Mahoney, Portland Democrat, went so far as to sponsor a bill to abolish the whole system, but his bill isn't given much chance.

Civil Defense Priority

Civil defense legislation — which Governor McKay calls the most pressing problem — might be passed by both houses next week.

The main defense bill appropriates \$68,147 to finance a vastly enlarged state civil defense agency to be created Feb. 1. Another bill to be rushed through would give state industrial accident insurance to civil defense workers.

During the week there were 87 bills introduced, compared with 77 two years ago. But that comparison doesn't mean much, because of the many department bills in the hands of committees.

Two Loggers Being Held On Auto Larceny Charges

Richard Homer Stokes, 21, of Portland and Robert Gene Cannon, 21, of Oakland, both loggers, are being held in the Douglas county jail on \$2,500 bail or charges of larceny of an auto, reported District Judge A. J. Geddes.

The two men were brought back from California by a deputy sheriff to face the counts. They are charged with the theft on Nov. 22, of a car owned by Doran Beekley, who had loaned the car to a friend, Johnny Plummer, according to Geddes.

The charge brought by the district attorney alleges that the two men "stole" a 1947 Buick Wildcat from Taketea Falls to Roseburg. Plummer, Ennis to Roseburg, stopped to have the car's tires repaired, but instead of waiting he decided to go on, with the understanding Stokes and Cannon would bring the car to Medford. The complaint charges that the two appropriated the car for their own use.

Catholic Bishops Will Study Pope's Decree

VATICAN CITY — (P) — Catholic bishops throughout the world, as a result of their church's ban of clergymen from Rotary, are expected to re-examine all organizations of this type so as to guide Catholic laity, an authoritative Vatican source said today.

A decree of the holy office congregation, of which Pope Pius is prefect, published Thursday, prohibited Catholic clergymen from belonging to Rotary or attending its meetings.

Today, a member of the congregation reiterated that the decree applies "implicitly" to similar bodies. Its publication in the Vatican's L'Osservatore Romano, ordered by the pontiff, this source said, is a further indication of its general purport.

State Dubious On Use Of Federal Shelter Funds

SALEM — (P) — There isn't much chance that Oregon will get the \$9,450,000 which the federal government would give the state to build bomb shelters, civil defense officials said today.

This money could be used only if the state puts up an equal amount.

The civilian defense authorities said they didn't know where they could get the money to match it.

Montana Wool Brings National Record Price

BIG TIMBER, Mont. — (P) — About 240,000 pounds of wool sold here this week at \$1.30 1/2 cents a pound, believed a national record.

O. B. O'Dell of Big Timber bought the 25,000-ounce Sweetgrass county clip for the R. H. Lindsay company of Boston, for shipment late in June or early in July.

About 70 growers contributed to the wool pool.

Woman Is Convicted Of Killing Her Husband

CORVALLIS — (P) — A life term in prison for battering her husband to death with the family automobile today confronted Mrs. Suzann Hansen.

The gray-haired, 50-year-old mother of three grown daughters was convicted by a circuit court jury that reported just before midnight last night.

She was the first woman ever tried in Benton county on a murder charge.

In union practice, the term "closed shop" has reversed its meaning. In the early days a closed shop was one that employed non-union men.

March Of Dimes Campaign Begins In Nation Monday

Thousands of Oregon polio fighters will throw their active support behind the annual March of Dimes Monday in the opening phase of a two-week campaign for funds to carry the heaviest burden that infantile paralysis has ever imposed on the American people.

A. G. Henninger, Douglas county chairman of the 1951 campaign, said that volunteers in every Douglas county community are out to make this year's drive a success.

In Roseburg, members of the Roseburg Active club put out collection containers in the city and surrounding area today. The familiar containers have also been put out in most of the other communities. Promotional activities will take many forms, said Henninger.

Treasurers of many of Oregon's 26 chapters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis have been emptied or badly depleted during a year that brought the state an unprecedented 515 to 520 polio cases. Three hundred and twenty-five Oregonians were stricken in 1949, and carry-over cases from that year, and even earlier, have added to the drain on Oregon chapters.

The national picture was much the same, according to Dr. E. T. Hedlund, of Portland who is serving as state March of Dimes chairman for the 12th consecutive year. Dr. Hedlund said that 1950 was the third straight year of high polio incidence in this country. More than 100,000 cases were tallied for 1948-1949-1950 combined—or almost as many as the entire case load for the previous decade.

March of Dimes monies are used for patient care and epidemic aid during the three years amounted to \$58,000,000.

"In this state last year," Dr. Hedlund said, "one case alone cost more than \$12,000. The disease is always expensive, in dollars and cents and in human suffering, and this is the most crucial point in our battle against it. Let's all punch together to kayo polio."

His appeal was backed by President Truman and Governor Douglas McKay. Mr. Truman declared that the battle against polio is "everybody's fight" and "no victim stands alone." Governor McKay said that "if ever a great humanitarian cause needed the support of every American, the March of Dimes is that cause and this is the time."

Death In Gas Chamber Awaits Convicted Killer

OREGON CITY — (P) — Death in the state gas chamber was the verdict of a circuit court jury which late last night convicted Wayne L. Long, 26-year-old convict of killing Walter Rucker, 28, Portland carpenter.

The jury was out four hours. When it returned to the courtroom and the foreman pronounced the verdict, Long, also charged with bank robbery and shooting down an FBI agent, sat bolt upright in his chair.

His face became ashen and his lips twitched.

The verdict of "guilty as charged" upheld the state's contention that Long put a 45 caliber pistol bullet through Rucker's brain June 14 in order to get his truck for use in the bank robbery next day.

Oregonians Injured In Car-Truck Crash

BOISE — (P) — Four Oregon men and a Kansan were injured in a car-truck collision 11 miles west of Boise.

Seriously injured was a man tentatively identified as Clem Purdy of Abilene, Kans. Purdy is still unconscious in a Boise hospital.

Boise hospitals reported as "fair" the condition of Merle D. Chase, Eugene, Ore., who suffered a fractured leg and possible rib injuries, and Eugene Chase, Springfield, Ore., a deep leg cut. In "good" condition are Chester Chase, Springfield, and Harry Harbert, Eugene. Harbert received head injuries.

The four Oregon men were riding in a 1950 automobile which collided with a panel truck driven by Purdy. Ada county sheriff's officials said full details of the accident were not yet known.

Lewis Leon King Held Under \$4000 Bail Set By Judge

Lewis Leon King, 25, of Roseburg, is being held in the Douglas county jail in connection with two felony charges — one, the early morning robbery of the Vets lounge on Dec. 18, reported District Judge A. J. Geddes.

Upon arraignment in district court Friday, Geddes set King's bail at \$2000 on a charge of burglary not in a dwelling and an additional \$2000 for larceny by bailie.

The first court charges King with the theft of approximately \$175 from the cash register and amusement machines sometime after the Vets Lounge 2 a.m. closing time, according to Geddes. City police said the devices had been pried open with a tool, such as a screw driver.

On the same day King reportedly rented a 1950 Ford pickup from the Beehive Truck Co. with the stipulation that it not be taken out of this county. King is charged in the second count with driving the truck to Portland and abandoning it there, according to the judge.

Apprehended in Reno, N. v., King was returned to Roseburg by a Douglas county deputy sheriff and Roseburg city policeman.
