The infantile paralysis fund raising campaign is slated to begin Jan. 15 and continue through Jan. 31. Mrs. Butler was appointed community chairman of the polio foundation in the Winston Dillard area for the campaign. Mrs. Butler and Mrs. McCord are distributing the coin containers and posters in the various business houses. Rev. Drew is to contact the mills in the community.

In 1950, Oregon and the nation experienced the third year of the worst infantile paralysis epidemic period in history. It is the wish of the committee to put the project in their community "over the top." A request has also been made to "dig a little deeper" to help with the national foundation.

association meeting in the Riddle school Thursday evening, Jan. 18, concerning the work of the polio foundation.
