Have Sandwiches For The Visitors

That big tray of sandwiches for the visitors should be rich in protein. There's nothing like a new year to make the gang ravenous. Here are some hints on protein values—use bakers' bread that is high in non-fat milk. Many loaves today contain non-fat milk solids of seven ounces of milk in each pound of bread. You'll find this stated on the wrapper. These extra milk solids appreciably raise the protein value of the bread, supplementing the natural protein of the wheat.

Remember, too, that dairy foods (milk, cream, butter, cheese) are rich in protein, so also are meat, fish and eggs. Get these into your "big eats" sandwiches and then—Happy New Year.

Cheese and Tomato Filling (Makes about 3 sandwiches)

One 3-ounce package cream cheese, 1 tablespoon milk or cream, 4 teaspoon salt, dash pepper, 1 large firm tomato, skinned (remove tomato skin by plunging into boiling water or twisting on a fork over a flame), 2 tablespoons chopped watercress.

Soften cream cheese with milk and mix until creamy. Add salt and pepper. Cut tomato into very small cubes.

Add the tomato pulp and cubes to the cream cheese. Add chopped watercress and blend mixture well. Spread on slices of buttered white toast. Cover with second slice of toast and serve.

Egg-Salmon Filling (Makes about 1½ cups filling)

One 1-ounce can salmon, 2 hard-boiled eggs, chopped, 3 tablespoons minced green pepper, 1 teaspoon minced onion, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1 tablespoon catsup, 2 or 3 tablespoons mayonnaise.

Flake and bone salmon. Combine all ingredients and blend well. Place on buttered slices of rye or pumpernickel bread. Cover with top slice of buttered bread and serve. May be stored, tightly covered, in the refrigerator.

Spiced Ham Filling (Makes about 1½ cups filling)

One cup cooked ground ham, ¼ cup finely chopped pickles, ¼ cup grated American cheese, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1 teaspoon dry mustard, salt and pepper to taste, 2 tablespoons mayonnaise.

Combine all ingredients and blend together well. Place on buttered slices of rye or pumpernickel bread. Cover with top slice of buttered bread and serve. May be stored, tightly covered, in the refrigerator.

It's Party Time For Teen-Agers

Start this new year off with a bang for your teen-agers and their friends. Lots to eat, an unlimited supply of chilled assorted carbonated beverages served right in the bottles and lots of fun for everybody—that's the 1951 recipe.

To solve the "big eats" problem economically but with a flourish that will delight the teen-age set, try this special recipe. It's a tangy, sweet-tart combination of meat, cheese and crisp green pepper, made with a carbonated beverage base.

Serve this teentime rabbit with an assortment of things to put it on in separate bowls, such as cooked rice garnished with pimiento, crisp cereal flakes, Chinese noodles and potato chips. Let the boys and girls mix some or all of these on their plates and top with the rabbit.

Teentime Rabbit (Serves 4-6)

One 12-ounce can luncheon meat, 2 bottles cola carbonated beverage, ½ pound packaged processed American cheese, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 4 teaspoon dry mustard, 2 teaspoons vinegar, 1 egg, slightly beaten, 1 green pepper, chopped.

Dice meat into ¼-inch cubes. Cover with contents of 1 bottle of the cola and let stand 1 hour, then drain. Slice cheese into top of double boiler. Heat over boiling water. When cheese has melted, stir in seasonings, vinegar, ¼ cup of freshly-opened cola beverage, blend, then stir in egg. Continue to cook and stir until thickened. Add meat and green pepper. Cover and keep warm over hot water until ready to serve.

Double the recipe, if the party has hearty eaters, or is more than six. For fancier fare, ham, cut in cubes, may be used in place of the luncheon meat; but give it the same cola-marinating treatment.

Savory Celery

Blend together equal amounts of cream cheese, mashed liverwurst and a little minced onion; moisten to paste consistency with milk or cream. Stuff celery stalks with mixture; chill before serving.
