

May Alter Draft Rules For College Students

Selective service rules for college students may be altered, John L. Saunders, chairman of the Douglas county board, reports. The local board has received many inquiries concerning the status of college students, he said. Under existing rules, college students are deferred until the end of the academic year in June, but he said, many students want to join some other branch of the armed forces than the army. Saunders says he has been notified by state headquarters that college enlistment is being discussed by the department of Defense. He said the state draft officials said the local board will be notified promptly if any change is made in the selective service procedure.

Iceland Next Stop Of "Ike"; France Halts Red Foes

PARIS — (AP) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower has left by plane for Reykjavik, continuing his survey tour of Atlantic pact nations and their plans to defend Western Europe against Russian communism. As Eisenhower flew homeward after his hurried two-week tour of West European Atlantic pact signers, France marked the end of his visit by naming a top military man to head all of her armed forces—a move the new supreme Atlantic pact commander reportedly had urged.

Gen. Alphonse Juin was appointed to the new post of inspector general of French armed forces. The 62-year-old Juin worked with Eisenhower in the Italian campaign of World War II and was chief of the French national defense general staff from 1944 to 1946.

Gen. Eisenhower had another reason here to feel he was making progress in alerting western Europe to Communist danger. Red plans for demonstrations against him flopped completely in Paris and other French cities.

French Communists, under orders from the Kremlin, planned an "Eisenhower Go Home" rally for last night. It fizzled out after the French government mar-

shalled 14,500 troops and police to enforce a ban against it. Some 5,000 demonstrators turned out in Paris.

A total of 3,267 of them were arrested and the rest went home. All but 54 of those arrested were released later. Of these, 48 were foreigners, who will be expelled from France. The other six are being held for illegally carrying arms and insulting or resisting an officer. Nine police were slightly injured.

Belgians Gyped In White Mice Breeding Racket

BRUSSELS, Belgium — (AP) — Some prolific white mice that were supposed to multiply into a small fortune have bred a lot of trouble and unwanted offspring around Belgium.

The advertisers said the young white mice were needed in laboratory experiments and promised that the mating couples, sold in minimum groups of five pairs, would produce plenty of profits.

They produced thousands upon thousands of white mice but no profits. Crates of white mice came by the carload to the unsuspecting railroad stationmaster at Charleroi—the address listed by the advertisers.

When they remained uncollected after several days, the distraught stationmaster refused to accept further shipments. He had his thousands of mice destroyed. The thousands more that kept arriving were shipped back to the senders.

Frantic Belgians, some with as many as 500 white mice in their homes and many more coming regularly, called in police. But the authorities said there was no legal basis for any action against anybody—except perhaps those would-be breeders who tried to wash their hands of the whole thing by turning loose their white mice into the streets.

Oregon Industries Hit Air Pollution Bill

SALEM — (AP) — Oregon's biggest industries don't want the legislature to pass the air pollution bill at this session.

They told the senate public health committee that the bill, which would let the state sanitary authority deal with the smoke problem in cities, would cost industry too much money. And they added that with wartime metals shortages, it probably would be hard to get equipment to sop industrial smoke.

Arguing against the measure were representatives of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, Portland General Electric Co., Crown Zellerbach corporation, Pirtex company, Pacific Power and Light Co., Portland Gas and Coke Co., and the Reynolds Metals company.

Dean F. E. Price of the Oregon State college school of agriculture said that unless Oregon does something about the smoke problem, it will find itself in the same predicament as smog-covered southern California.

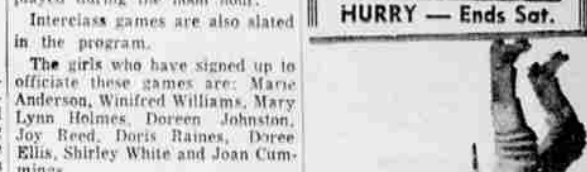
