Abe Lincoln Firm In Fee Collection, Records Reveal

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. — (AP) — An Illinois historian says records deny a popular assumption that Abraham Lincoln was easy going in money matters.

Dr. Harry E. Pratt, acting state historian says a attorney Lincoln was "determined to collect his fee regardless of its size."

In the five known cases Lincoln took to court over fees, one involved \$5,000 and another only a \$5 fee.

The \$5,000 was the biggest fee he ever collected as an attorney. He halved it with his law partner, William Herndon of Springfield.

Lincoln charged the \$5,000 fee when he was retained by the Illinois Central railroad to defend it against McLean county tax action in circuit court.

The county sought to tax the railroad in addition to the state tax provided by the road's Illinois charter, granted in 1851.

The case was decided against Lincoln in circuit court. He appealed to the state supreme court which upheld him, ruling that the county could not tax the railroad.

But railroad officials thought his fee too high—it was "more than a New York lawyer would charge," Pratt says.

So Lincoln returned to McLean county circuit court in January, 1857, to sue the railroad, and obtained a judgment.

Lincoln appeared before a justice of the peace to collect the \$5 fee.

He had billed Samuel Brown of Taylorville \$10 for defending him in 1850 on charges growing out of Brown's firing at a gang of boys raiding his watermelon patch.

Lincoln could collect only \$5 from Brown so he went to the justice of the peace.

"He collected," Pratt says, "but it was four years from the time the suit began until he got his other \$5."

Lincoln's determination to collect his last fees wasn't one-sided, Pratt says.

In the famous Duff Armstrong

murder trial, Lincoln refused to take a fee for defending him because Armstrong had befriended him in New Salem.

Eisenhower Acceptance Of Presidency Foreseen

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Harry C. Butcher, wartime naval aide to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, says his onetime boss would accept the presidency on a coalition ticket if the public demanded it in a national crisis.

Butcher last saw Eisenhower just before the general accepted the post of supreme commander of Atlantic pact nations.

"At that time the general said he would work like the devil in Europe for 18 months," Butcher told a civic group yesterday. "I won't speculate on the significance of that time limit."

"Personally, I'd hate to see him take the beating of the office. But I can imagine circumstances under which even Truman might say, 'What the country needs is Eisenhower.'"



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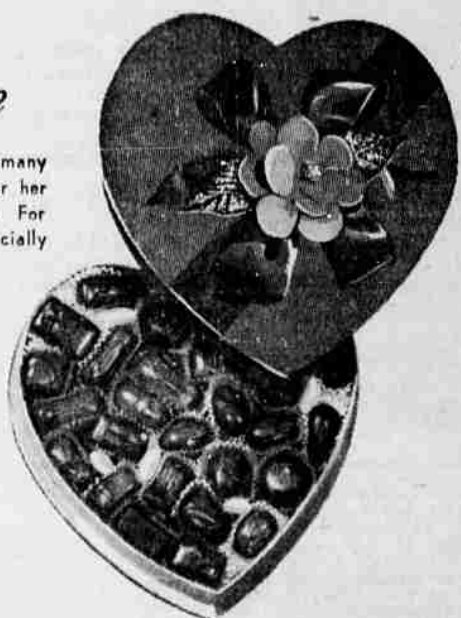
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
