New Drug Reduces Bad After-Effects Of Anaesthesia

PHILADELPHIA — (AP) — A new drug has been reported by the University of Pennsylvania to reduce sharply the unpleasant after-effects of taking anaesthesia.

The university identified the drug as dramamine. It was developed by the husband-and-wife team of Dr. Alan and Dr. Helen Rubin.

In its report the university said: "When dramamine was not administered in advance of anaesthesia, it was noted that more than 60 percent of patients under observation experienced either nausea or vomiting, or both, as an after-math of their experiences."

"But when dramamine was used prior to anaesthesia, the incidence of such disturbances was reduced to approximately 25 percent."

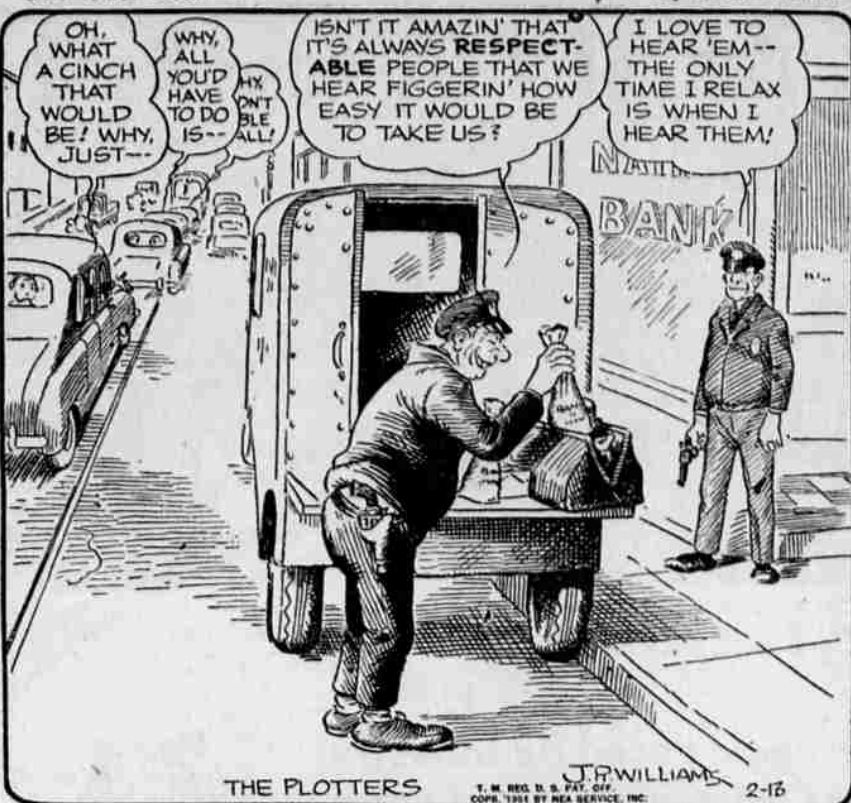
CRASH DAMAGE SLIGHT

Parents Of Rich Children In Georgia Getting Public Assistance, Probe Reveals

ATLANTA — AP — The state of Georgia has turned up 31 cases of rich or near rich children with one or more parents receiving public old age assistance.

And, said State Welfare Director Alan Kemper, that was just a "sampling" produced when he asked his clerks to "bring me a few cases."

In nearly every instance, too, Kemper added, the children felt the meager checks were a form of interest on their high taxes.

Some of these people, he continued, were just plain penniless, even charging their aged parents for lights, water, heat and food.

On the list were judges, sheriffs, corporation executives, politicians, an auditing contractor.

In case "K" Kemper reported: "A man and his wife live in a fashionable section of town, have a beautiful estate, lovely brick home and the property is surrounded by an electric fence. They employ a full time yard man and own two Cadillac cars."

"They do not allow the mother to live in the brick house but provide a small shack on the place. All they are willing to provide are lights and shelter. They insist the taxpayers provide the balance."

Kemper received another case in which a court judge, with a salary of \$10,000 to \$15,000 annually and other income, refused assistance to his mother because he contributed to the community chest and paid taxes.

If that is done, said Kemper, welfare payments to the really needy may be increased.

Kemper reported that many times his case workers had sons and daughters say, "Why, yes, I could take care of my parents but everybody else is getting pension, mother get it, too?"

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Net Fishermen Win House Vote On Alsea Closing

SALEM — (AP) — Commercial fishermen won a thumping victory in the first round of their running argument against sports fishermen with the House voting 43-16 against closing the Alsea river to commercial fishing.

The bill, introduced by Rep. Francis Ziegler, Corvallis, was sought by sports fishermen, who said the river should be closed to commercial fishing so it could be allowed to replenish itself.

Two similar bills probably will be acted upon in a few days by the House. They would close the Siuslaw and Coquille rivers to commercial fishermen.

Rep. Melvin Goode, Albany, told the House that commercial fishing in the river has decreased 75 percent in the past 15 years.

Goode criticized the fish commission for taking the commercial fishermen's side, asserting that two-thirds of the commission's revenue comes from the state general fund, and the rest from commercial fishing licenses.

But Rep. Joseph M. Dyer, Astoria, led the fight against the bill with a statement that scientific propagation of fish, not closure, is the answer to the problem.

"The program of hatcheries has begun to develop the streams," Dyer said. "Civilization has killed off the fish. This is not just a matter of the Alsea river, but it calls for a coast wide study of trolling to protect and regulate fishing."

Rep. Graham Killam, Portland, said the commercial fishermen shouldn't fight closure of a stream when that stream isn't profitable to them.

"Oregonians are subsidizing the commercial fishermen," Killam said.

Rep. Paul Geddes, Roseburg, said that the 1947 closure of the Umpqua river has resulted in building up the fisheries.

Only seven streams are left for commercial fishermen, said Rep. Gust Anderson, Portland labor leader.

"The sportsmen can fish and still eat, even if they don't catch a fish. There is room for both kinds of fishermen."

The former movie actress was dressed in black—low heel shoes, black suit and beret with dotted veil. A yellow scarf provided the only splash of color.

Miss Garbo said she is 45, that she was born in Stockholm, Sept. 18, 1905.



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
