

Little Child Chewed To Death By Bulldog

KILLEEN, Tex. — (AP) — Three-year-old Constela Mary Louise de la Pena was chewed to death yesterday when she ventured too close to a chained bulldog.

The mutilated body was found by the dog's owner, Master Sgt. E. Tucker, when he returned from his duties at Fort Hood, near here. Tucker said the dog had never been vicious before and had often played with other children in the block.

Mental Patient Subdued After Nine-Hour Battle

NEW ORLEANS — (AP) — A pajama-clad mental patient, who hurled iron pipe, slate, and invective from a three-story hospital roof for nine hours, was finally subdued by tear gas.

The 30-year-old New Orleans veteran, unidentified by authorities, dropped from the roof of the U. S. marine hospital to an attic room a few feet below.

When police entered the attic room, he started hurling water and tear gas. Then a tear gas bomb was exploded. The veteran leaped through a trap door to a lower floor where attendants grabbed him.

Death Strikes During Face Lifting Operation

SEATTLE — (AP) — Mrs. Lyle King, Friday Harbor business woman, died in a beauty clinic here while undergoing a face lifting operation.

Coroner John P. Brill Jr. said Mrs. King died of suffocation caused by a swelling in her throat. Brill said fluids used in the face lifting operation are being tested to determine whether they may have provoked the swelling.

OSC TEACHER DIES

CORVALLIS — (AP) — Death Wednesday claimed Dr. O. R. Chambers, 57, head of Oregon State college psychology department for 22 years.

He collapsed and died of cerebral hemorrhage while dressing in preparation for starting his day's work.

Special Rules Put Clamp On Moves Of Mrs. Neuberger

SALEM — (AP) — Rep. Maurine Neuberger, the Portland Democrat who's always getting into the hair of the house Republican leadership, generally comes out second best because she's overwhelmingly outnumbered.

But the House has to make special rules to beat her down. The house rules committee, for the second time this session, voted to make a special rule to take care of her.

Mrs. Neuberger, still angered because the House defeated her bill to allow sale of colored oleomargarine, tried to get revenge.

She made a motion to send back an ice cream bill to committee with instructions to make the ice cream makers say on the package when it is colored artificially.

It is a long-established custom around the legislature to send back bills with instructions. That's the only way to test House or Senate sentiment on proposals to amend bills.

However, Speaker John F. Steelhammer ruled her out of order. She appealed from his ruling, but got no support.

Then the rules committee introduced a proposed new rule which would prevent members from sending back bills to committee with instructions.

The first time the House made a rule for her was when she asked for use of the house chamber for a milk control hearing. There wasn't anything unusual about using the House for hearings, as it had been done several times before.

She was turned down on that, and then the House adopted a new rule to prevent the House from being used for hearings.

Textile Strike Spreads To Two More Factories

BOSTON — (AP) — The strike of 70,000 CIO woolen and worsted workers which closed 160 mills at the outset last Friday has filled an additional 3,050 employees in eight non-union plants.

Two more unorganized mills were added to the six others which had closed down last Monday.

They were the Bell company, Woonsocket, R. I., which employs 350, and the Prendergast mill, Pascoag, R. I., which employs 150.

Officials of both companies charged "threats of violence" were made by CIO pickets around the plants.

Meantime, representatives of the union and of the American Woolen company, with which negotiations broke down over a 15 cents an hour pay hike, reported "nothing new" in the way of settlement.

Brannan OKs Lakeview Sustained Yield Unit

PORTLAND — (AP) — Secretary of Agriculture Charles Brannan has approved the contested Lakeview federal sustained yield forest unit, H. J. Andrews, regional forester, said.

The unit was established last year by Lyle F. Watts, chief of the forest service. But his action was appealed by the Willow Ranch Lumber company which owns and operates a sawmill about six miles south of the Oregon state line, outside the unit.

National forest timber sold from the unit is to be manufactured only within specified areas surrounding Lakeview and Paisley.

'One More Show' Mea Saves Boys From Tragedy

NEW YORK — (AP) — Pleas of three youngsters for "just one more" television show saved them from possible death when the collapse of a Bronx apartment house retaining wall heaved an avalanche of earth into their bedrooms.

The all-day rain apparently weakened the 17-foot high, 15-foot long brick wall which supported the foundation earth of one apartment building and protected a lower, adjoining building.

A 300-pound boulder crashed into the bed that might have been occupied by Roger Manning, 5, and his brother, Edward, 7. Richard Selby, 11, wasn't in his bedroom either — as rocks and debris surged into the room.

The three small boys were in their living rooms. That night they won the daily TV argument of "one more show, just one more show."

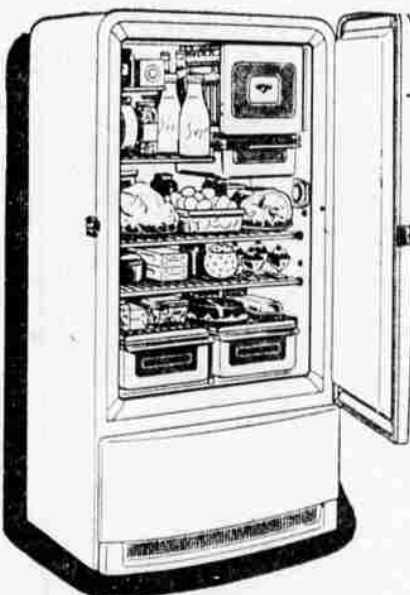

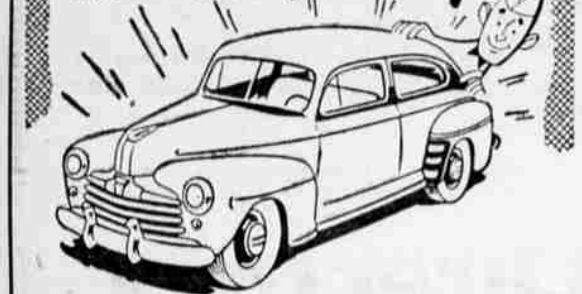
