mations and the youngsters banded such words as metamorphic, igneous, sedimentary, etc. Various samples of granite, pumice, etc., were passed around and carefully examined by the children. One boy after carefully feeling and lifting and sniffing at a piece of pumice asked the obvious question—"What does it look like?"

Pupils Not Coddled
The children in the blind school are not coddled—they carry on just as stiff a course of study as any child in a regular school system. They keep up with their age group so that when they are released from the blind school and sent to make their adjustment in public school at the high school level they are not handicapped academically.

It was a revelation to my fifth grade daughter to have lunch with the blind youngsters and visit their rooms in the dormitory. She was amazed at the neatness and dexterity of these children—"who spill less food than we do" and "who keep their rooms much neater than I do".

It was snowing on the occasion of one visit and I wondered whether these youngsters would have any capacity for enjoying snow. It didn't take me long to find out for there were snow men around the lawn, and the usual snow fights. Of course quite a number of the children are not completely without sight, but they all take part in the activities.

School Widely Noted
People familiar with the way the blind school is conducted do not think of it as an institution with inmates but rather as a school with special emphasis on some phases of the curriculum which will be of particular value to visually handicapped children.

We are fortunate to have in this state a progressive school of this type which has become noted throughout the country for the "Oregon Plan" for educating sightless children. This plan is based on fitting children for normal society as quickly as possible rather than coddling them and protecting them until they are never able to adjust themselves.

Soviets Have Spy Haven In Mexico, Trial Testimony

NEW YORK — (AP) — The Russian embassy in Mexico City was pictured in the atom spy trial here as being ready to aid spies fleeing the United States to avoid arrest.

David Greenglass, 29, a confessed spy who was employed on the atom bomb project at Los Alamos, N. M., said his brother-in-law, Julius Rosenberg, gave him Mexico.

Rosenberg, 33, an electrical engineer, is on trial with his wife, Ethel, 35, and radar expert Morton Sobell, 33, on charges of conspiring to spy for Russia in wartime. The charge carries a possible death penalty.

Greenglass returned to the witness stand after relating that less than a month after the first atom bomb was dropped on Hiroshima he gave Rosenberg plans for a later-model bomb.

He said Rosenberg tried several times to get him to flee the United States after learning of the arrest of Dr. Klaus Fuchs in England on espionage charges.

Greenglass said he ignored the advice, but that Rosenberg renewed the pressure after the arrest of Harry Gold, Philadelphia chemist, as a spy for Russia.
