## DIAL-LOG

A good children's radio program is a good adult program. This is accepted in principle by most radio leaders. But obviously, as a turn of the radio dial indicates, children's programs are in need of improvement. On the overall picture radio's crime has been a crime of omission—not a commission—for not broadcasting the best that the medium can both afford and express. So it remains for radio stations broadcasting on a local level to offer attractive and compelling children's shows. A glance at the weekly KRNR program log shows the station making sound strides in the advancement of what we call "good" radio.

Radio has a responsibility to children of all ages in all areas, and since the children listen approximately six hours a week, stations work hard to create and offer the best possible to this important audience segment.

The standard for a good children's program is entertainment, adventure, humor, imagination, good living, appreciation and proper English usage.

Some of the programs designed especially for children, but entertaining for all age groups: Uncle Bob and his doltish delinquent, Torrence—the talking terrapin—each night Monday through Friday at 7. Esther Geddes' "Magic Garden" at 6 Monday evenings. Saturday morning comes "Fun With Words" at 10:30—school children compete in a word game written by Lorraine Long. Monday through Friday at 3:30, the School Show goes on the air, from the schools, with the students taking over. Incidentally a show of the latter two types shows radio has a definite value in school work. It teaches the children to like English and teaches them the potentiality of radio as a method of communications. Such are examples of local production.

From the network the younger set's line-up of adventure tales starts at five right across the board. Mark Trail finds adventure in the conservation theme. Straight Arrow and Sky King blaze trails of excitement across the airways, and Bobby Benson sings a few songs with the B-Bar-B riders.

Two other shows worth mention: Standard School broadcast, Tuesday at 1:30 in conjunction with the school's music classes, and Don Lee's Symphonies for Youth—a full hour on Saturday morning starting at eleven.
