Ens. Miller Enrolled In Naval Line School

Reading, writing and arithmetic, navy style, is pretty much the curriculum for Ens. Wesley B. Miller, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Miller of Drain, now enrolled as a member of the 1951 class at the Naval General Line school, Monterey, Calif.

Special Board To Run State Fair Now Up To McKay

SALEM — (AP) — Bills to set up a special commission to run the Oregon state fair and to give \$50 to each discharged convict were sent to Governor McKay by the legislature, while the senate killed 18 to 11 a bill to prevent railroads from closing stations without consent of the public utilities commissioner.

The state fair bill, passed by the house with only 11 dissenting votes, would have the governor appoint a five-man commission to run the fair. It now is operated by state fair Director Leo Spitzbart, who is appointed by state agriculture Director E. L. Peterson.

Rep. Sprague Carter, Pendleton, said the "bill is an attempt to save the state fair. Rural exhibitors and machinery exhibitors are losing interest because the fair is becoming nothing but a carnival and race meet."

The opponents of the bill objected to setting up a new commission, asserting the state has too many boards and commissions already.

Peterson fired Spitzbart several weeks ago, but then rehired him. However, the sponsors of the bill denied that the dispute had anything to do with their introduction of the bill.

Convicts' Pay Upped

The convict bill would give \$50 to every discharged convict, and \$25 to each paroled convict. All they get now is \$5. This bill was passed by the house without opposition.

It would have provided that no railroad station with annual total receipts of more than \$10,000 could be closed without consent of the public utilities commissioner.

"Every railroad in the state has neglected its duties toward the people in the regions being served," said Sen. Phil Brady, Portland labor leader.

But Sen. Frederick S. Lampert, Salem, said the railroads can't afford to maintain unprofitable stations.

Whistling Swans Back In Oregon Habitat

LA GRANDE — (AP) — Whistling swans, once a rare sight in the Grande Ronde valley, now almost set the calendar here.

Hunted almost to extinction at one time, the birds have made such a comeback that a large flock swims in ponds around the Cove area.

As in the past two years, the big birds arrived on St. Patrick's day in their annual spring migration. This year only a few were in the first contingent, with the bulk of the flock arriving in later days.

Byrnes Refuses To Head States' Rights Ticket

COLUMBIA S. C. — (AP) — Gov. James F. Byrnes said flatly again he will not be a candidate for President on a states' rights Democratic or any other ticket.

Byrnes also declared in a letter to the 1948 states' rights former candidate, G. J. Sizem Thummond, that he will not "seek leadership" of the more than 1,000,000 voters who supported Thummond for President.

Byrnes is a former U. S. secretary of state and supreme court justice.

Farm Mortgage Fraud Draws Term In Prison

PORTLAND — (AP) — A 71-year-old farm realty operator was sentenced here to five years in prison on charges of larceny in farm management schemes.

The man, known as Henry Gardner but who said his true name was Irvin Jordan, was charged with selling a half interest in management of a farm near La Center, Wash., which he did not own.

Deputy District Attorney Charles E. Raymond said Gardner's transactions cost Mrs. Ethel Cadman, Seattle, \$10,000, and others amounts ranging up to \$5000.
