

SCHUSTER-PENNARIO CONCERT TO BE HELD MARCH 30



Leonard Pennario, pianist, above left, and Joseph Schuster, cellist, above right, will present the last concert of the season for the Roseburg Community Concert association March 30 at 8:15 p. m. in the junior high school auditorium. This concert replaces the concert scheduled by the Portland Symphony orchestra, which cancelled its tour on account of financial difficulties. Neither the association or Columbia Concerts Inc., were at fault for this and local officers have expressed their belief that the Pennario-Schuster concert will meet with great favor by the members. Schuster, who will have his accompanist with him, is one of the finest cellists of the times. He was



born in Constantinople. His parents were Russian and returned to Russia with him, when he was three years of age. He was a child prodigy and had gained considerable fame before he was in his teens. He studied at St. Petersburg conservatory and Hochschule fur Musik, Berlin. He made his professional debut as soloist with the Berlin Philharmonic. He played first cellist with the New York Philharmonic under Toscanini for several years. He has had numerous radio broadcasts, has made three tours of South America and has been a most popular soloist on his many tours in this country. He is married to an American girl and they have one son.

They visited friends and saw plays, but the climax of the visit was their flight, the first for Mrs. Dunn, to New York, where they stayed at the home of Mrs. Stevens' son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. N. A. Melatti, and the Melatti children, Robert, 3, and Maris and Adriana, 10-month old twins.

Mrs. Melatti, granddaughter of Mrs. Dunn, was formerly Jean Stevens. She has sung with the Chicago Opera company, the San Carlo and the Metropolitan and expects to return to the "Met" when her children are a few years older. The twins are famous in their own right as they are professional models for Constance Bannister, the famed baby photographer, and their pictures appear in numerous nationally circulated magazines. They recently appeared in "Redbook."

Mrs. Dunn, who is 80, who has a remarkable memory for happenings both ancient and recent, is now equipped with a load of twin stories for her friends and neighbors in Roseburg. She also plans to tell them about her 80th birthday party held Jan. 21 at her daughter's home in Highland Park, when a large number of friends brought gifts and assisted her in celebrating the occasion.

Mrs. Dunn was born in a log cabin at Beverly, Ill., in 1871. She set type for her husband's newspaper during her bridal year, 1889, at Stanton, Ill., fought prairie fires and blizzards in Minnesota in the early 1900's and has been pioneering ever since. To this day, she kills an occasional rattlesnake that wanders down to her land every once in awhile. Mrs. Dunn now has her own lawn and splits her own wood.

Now Mrs. Dunn is back in her home in Oregon taking care of 14 acres of land, but next winter, she will return again to Highland Park to be with her daughter.

Mrs. C. E. Roberts Chosen March 'Woman of Month'

Chosen Woman of the Month for March by the Umpqua unit of the American Legion auxiliary is Mrs. C. E. (Mary S.) Roberts, 435 Fowler street, a resident of Roseburg since 1915.

Mrs. Roberts, born Mary S. Swinney in Walworth, Wis., was the second of three daughters born to Joseph and Lue Bagley Swinney. Her parents moved from New York state to Wisconsin shortly after their marriage in 1880.

Mrs. Roberts remembers her farm home life as a happy time. Winter meant skating parties, bob sledding and many snowmen. Swimming parties were held in the many lakes in that section of Wisconsin in summer. They were dependant upon themselves for their entertainment at that time.

She received her schooling in the Walworth high school. She and her sisters usually walked to school but during extremely bad weather they relied on a horse drawn carriage. In school she was active in literary clubs, drama societies and played intra-mural basketball. Upon her graduation from high school in 1904 she entered the Milton college, Milton, Wis., completing a four year English major course in 1908. During her senior year she served as president of the literary society.

She began teaching in the Walworth high school and taught there for two years, 1908 to 1910. From 1910 to 1914, she taught English in the preparatory school of Milton college. During two summer periods, she attended classes at the University of Wisconsin in Madison.

The family moved to Roseburg in 1915. She met her husband, Charles E. Roberts, shortly after her arrival. They were married July 29, 1917. Their son, Charles, now a civil engineer with the Bureau of Indian Affairs in Tonpinitz, Wash., was born in 1917. John, now employed in Oakland, Calif., was born in 1918. Both boys are married. Mrs. Roberts is very proud of her granddaughter, Susan.

During the school year of 1934, Mrs. Roberts served as president of the Roseburg senior high school PTA. She has been quite active in the work of the Presbyterian Association of Southwestern Oregon having been treasurer in 1935, secretary 1936 and serving two years as president in 1937 and 1938.
