For Budget Meal Try Texas Hash

To make a little hamburger go a long way, try this hearty recipe.

Texas Hash
Two large onions, sliced, 2 green peppers, cut fine, 3 tablespoons fat, 1 pound hamburger, 2 cups canned tomatoes, 1/2 cup uncooked rice, 1 teaspoon chili powder, 2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Cook onions and green pepper slowly in hot fat until onions are yellow. Add hamburger and fry until mixture falls apart. Add tomatoes, rice, and seasonings and mix. Put in large greased casserole cover, and bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 45 minutes, or until done. Serves 8. To serve 4, divide recipe in half.

Variations: 1. Instead of rice, use 1 cup uncooked spaghetti, macaroni or noodles. 2. Substitute 1 cup chopped celery stalks and 4 leaves for green pepper. 3. Use 1 teaspoon paprika instead of chili powder.

Sausage and Apple Patties
Two medium apples, pared and cored, 2 teaspoons lemon juice (about), dash of salt, 1 pound sausage meat, 2 tablespoons finely chopped onion, 1 cup crushed raisin bran. Cut apples into six 1/4-inch slices.

Organist Will Present Concert At Church Sunday

Miss Alice Clement, organist, will be presented in a concert to be given by the First Baptist church choir Sunday April 15, at 7:30 p. m. The public is invited. There will be no admission charge.

Miss Clement needs no introduction to Roseburg as a fine musician, as a number of Roseburg people have studied under her, when she was head of the music department at Linfield college. She was director of the Conservatory of Music of Albany college and then for many years was head of the music department at Linfield, where she resigned in 1947 to live and teach in her family home at Beaverton.

Miss Clement was graduated from Pacific University Conservatory of Music with a diploma in piano. She received her bachelor of music degree with major in organ from Northwestern university, Chicago, and her master of music degree with major in piano from Coombs College of Music, Philadelphia.

She was awarded honors by the French government in 1939 in Fontainebleau and received a diploma as teacher organist and a diploma as teacher of the organ. Spent years of study in the United States supplemented by a year of piano with Alberto Jonas in Germany and a summer of organ and theoretical work in France with Nadia Boulanger and Ludovic Panel.

Miss Clements has presented many concerts in cities throughout Oregon. More recently, she has given frequent concerts on electronic organs as she has had her own Hammond since they were first introduced. She is immediate past president of the Oregon Music Teachers association; member of the American Guild of Organists and a member of Delta Kappa Gamma and Mu Phi Epsilon.

Season with lemon juice and salt. Combine sausage meat, onion, and bran and shape mixture into 12 small balls. Place balls between two sheets of waxed paper and flatten into patties, 1/2 inch thick. Put together in pairs with an apple slice between patties. Press edges of patties together to seal in apple slice. Arrange in shallow baking dish. Bake, uncovered, in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 30 minutes.
