Fuertado voluntarily came here yesterday to talk with district attorney Frank S. Hogan.

Several hours later the former player was arrested and held in \$1,000 bail for his appearance today in felony court. Now married, Fuertado quit school in January, 1950, during his senior year.

Hogan said Fuertado got \$4,000 for helping to fix three LIU games in the 1949-1950 season and one game the previous season. LIU lost all four contests.

The LIU games—all played at the Garden—were with Duquesne (53-64), North Carolina state (52-55), Cincinnati (63-85), and Syracuse (52-80).
